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### FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT



Dear PPS Community,

Governor Ted Kulongoski this morning proposed a state budget for 2009-2011 that reflects the tough choices forced upon our state by the dismal economy, and contains some difficult news for our K-12 schools.

The Governor proposed a \$6.39 billion State School Fund to pay for Oregon's K-12 schools. That's \$147 million more than in the current two-year budget, a 2.4 percent increase over two years. By the states own reckoning, at \$6.39 billion, the State School Fund is more than \$150 million short of the amount the state would need to spend to maintain essential services.

The Governor suggested he would ask a supplemental session of the Legislature in 2010 to tap the Education Stability Fund to protect schools in the second year of the budget. To be prudent, he did not ask the Legislature to commit the funding now, in case the economy worsens.

School district's costs are rising far more than 2 percent, in health care, energy, services and supplies, and in salaries for staff, if they are to keep up with the cost of living. In addition, Oregon schools already are taking significant mid-year cuts in our state funding.

That leaves Portland Public Schools facing an uncertain budget future. We have been able to maintain our services and absorb the current state funding cut with some belt tightening and by tapping our reserves, but those reserves could quickly be exhausted.

I have asked our budget analysts to review the Governors budget closely and present a more detailed picture of our PPS financial outlook to the School Board's Finance Committee Tuesday, Dec. 9.

Today's announcement is just the first step in the process of opening a statewide conversation about how to pay for our schools over the next two years, and beyond. We promise to keep you posted, and hope you will join us in advocating for our schools and our students in Salem.

### Bank Day moves from Wednesdays to Mondays starting December 8, 2008!

Please note that due to our expanding program, space issues have led us to need to move Bank Day from Wednesday mornings from 7:30-8 in the library to Monday mornings (same time, same place). Thank you all for being flexible, and we hope this new time will work for your schedules. Change always takes a bit of adjusting, so we appreciate your flexibility. Just a reminder too - if you are using your child's bank day account as savings for their 5th grade trip here are some numbers to consider: We have roughly 30 weeks of bank day during a school year. If your child deposits:

\$1 each week - that's \$30 a year, \$180 over 6 years if starting in kindergarten. \$5 each week - \$150 a year, \$900 over 6 years.

\$10 each week - \$300 a year, \$1800 over 6 years (slightly under-estimated costs between \$2,000-\$2,500 for the trip).

\$20 each week - \$600 a year, \$3600 over 6 years (should cover spending money and have some to save for the 8th grade trip).

However, Bank day is not exclusively for trip savings!! It's main purpose is to encourage children to establish patterns of saving money for whatever purpose chosen by the child/family. While we only accept deposits at the school, you are free to make withdrawals at any WAMU branch. You simply need to bring your child and either their bank account number or social security number with you for them to access their account. A secondary purpose for bank day is for the students who participate as tellers. It provides a fun and safe environment to develop their people communication, information tracking, alphabetizing, computer and counting skills.

If you haven't set up an account yet, stop by and pick up a form and join us! If you have an account and haven't been depositing please put us on your schedule, and help your children see the value of saving for something they really want.

### RICHMOND SCHOOL FOUNDATION (RSF) UPDATE and LETTER

### WHY DO I GIVE TO RICHMOND SCHOOL FOUNDATION?

Each month in the *Richmond Shinbun*, the Richmond School Foundation (RSF) is going to highlight a piece from a foundation member or other Richmond parent on why they donate to the foundation. In addition, we'll give you an update on the progress of the Richmond Parent Pledge Drive. You are all amazing parents and your support of your children's education is remarkable. Last month, Rich Shawen wrote an inspiring piece how his daughter motivates him to donate to the foundation. This month, Andy Felcher, the foundation president, will give his reasons for donating to the foundation.

### WHY I DONATE TO THE RICHMOND SCHOOL FOUNDATION:

Dear Richmond Parents.

I donate to the Richmond School Foundation because I believe in good public education and I believe that when we all do our part and work together, we are stronger than as individuals. A school is about a community. And our school community thrives when we all do our part in a way that work for each of us.

Like most of us, I went to public school from kindergarten all the way thru high school. I loved it and the education was very good and prepared me well for college and beyond. In those days, public schools were generally well-funded and high quality. But that was more than 25 years ago. (Don't tell anyone how old I am!) Sure, there were fund-raising events back then...but it was a different time. My parents had bake sales to raise money for extras like camping trips and science fairs. A sound public education system was a given and was adequately funded by the state. My parents never needed to raise money for teachers, music, gym, art...class sizes were all under 24-26.

While I continue to believe a good public school education is essential for our children, times have changed around us. The level of funding for public education has not kept up with the expense of a quality education. It may provide enough for an "average" education, but not an "above average" or an "exceptional" one.

As the president of the Richmond School Foundation, you may be surprised to hear me say this, but I wish we did not have a need for a school foundation. I find it appalling that we need to raise money in order to have reasonable staffing at our school and a high quality education. And maybe someday we won't need to raise funds to supplement inadequate state funding. But at present, if we don't do it, no one else will. For our own kids' sake, I do not want to stand by and have children miss out on the possibility of a better education. It is not worth it to me to make a statement and not supplement our own children's education if we can do it. Their future is not worth the gamble.

So in the end, there are two simple reasons I donate to the Richmond School Foundation. (1) The first is that I believe there is little that is more important than my children's education. There is nothing more important than a good education to help you in your way in the world...whether you want to be a forester, a graphic designer, a doctor, a dancer, a salesman or whatever. It all begins with an excellent primary education. Without the added funds donated by parents for staff at our school, we would not have the exceptional dual-language program we have. (2) The second reason is that I believe we are a community and we can do great things by working together. The basis of the Richmond School Foundation fundraising ethos is that we all participate. We do not have a large event that counts on the generosity of a few. Instead, we have a parent pledge drive that asks everyone to do something...big or small, once or twice, whatever way you can and works for you.

And it is working: each year, more and more families are participating at levels big and small. Over the last four years, the number of families and total raised have continued to rise with more than 50% of families contributing. If 100% of parents donate \$320 twice this year, we will raise \$268,800...enough for 2.6 additional teachers. Small class sizes with art and music anyone? Why not dream?

Our school is exceptional. And it starts with active parents and great teachers and staff. Thank you to all of you.

### RICHMOND FOUNDATION MONTHLY UPDATE:

The fall half of the parent pledge drive ends December 31<sup>st</sup>. For the 4<sup>th</sup> year in a row, we are further along at this time of year than at any year in the past. Parents, grandparents, other family members continue to increase participation and donations at an amazing pace. ### Buy Coffee in compostable bags to Support Richmond's Elm Trees

Richmond school's 20 American Dutch Elm trees need to be inoculated every 3 years to resist Dutch Elm Disease which can kill the beautiful trees which shade our school grounds. During inoculations in June of 2007, we used 800 microinjections of a fungicide recommended by foresters to protect our trees. The cost per injection was \$3.50 for a total of \$2800. For the next round of inoculations in 2010, prices and shipping costs are expected to be slightly higher.

To raise money for the inoculations, Save Our Elms, a 501c(3) non-profit, partners with Portland Roasting to sell delicious, freshly roasted coffee to the Richmond community. \$4.60 from every bag of regular coffee sold allows us to buy approximately 1.31 microinjectors. (Save Our Elms gets \$5.05 from every bag of decaf coffee, too!) The coffee is delicious, environmentally friendly and costs \$10/pound for regular and \$11/pound for decaf.

If you haven't tried the coffee yet, ground regular coffee is available for purchase in the office. The price is \$10 /pound (checks made to Save Our Elms, please.) You can look in the coffee basket on Patsy's counter for the variety you like and either give your money to Patsy or place it in the box marked "Save Our Elms" on the office front wall. I place orders every Thursday morning at 8 AM for whole bean, decaf, and additional ground coffee. For an order, please fill out an order form (some are usually available on the table in front of the office or on Richmond's website) indicating your coffee choice and whole bean or ground preference and attach payment. (Please note decaf coffee costs \$11.00 a pound.) Coffee from orders will be available in the office by the next afternoon and it will be held in Patsy's coffee drawer just for you. Patsy can retrieve this for you; she is a great supporter of this program. We accept donations as well.

### Portland Roasting descriptions:

All coffees for Richmond are our Farm Friendly<sup>TM</sup> Direct coffees because as important to us as the quality of our coffee is our social responsibility. We strongly believe that we can make a positive difference in the coffee world through direct, socially responsible coffee sourcing. We pay growers a premium for their coffee with 100% of the premium going to farm and community projects. All of these projects are designed to give back directly to the farmers - furthering the long term sustainable infrastructure.

**Ethiopian – Kochere:** This coffee is part of Project H.O.P.E., which stands for Hope and Opportunity for the People of Ethiopia. We are helping build a much needed community center for the Ethiopian farming community of Kochere to provide a common meeting place for educational purposes, as well as a vital medical dispensary for the people of Kochere.

French Organic - Certified organic; dark roast

Tanager's Song – an organic blend (Central American and Indonesian certified shade grown coffees), silky-rich and full-bodied with a caramel-like finish.

Papua New Guinea - a single varietal that is passive organic.

Farm Friendly Direct, SWP (Swiss Water Process) French Decaf – directly sourced, chemical free, dark roast.

Farm Friendly Direct, SWP (Swiss Water Process) Morning Decaf – directly sourced, chemical free, light roast.
