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Latest News on Portland Public Schools' Budget for 2009-2010

PPS faces a serious budget gap: Based on the Governor's proposed budget, Portland Public Schools faces a \$22 million shortfall for 2009-10.

While we do have reserves to blunt the potential impact of this gap, we must use these reserves wisely – because we do not know how long the economic downturn will last.

We will keep you informed as the budget is developed: It is too early to anticipate the final PPS budget and its impact on schools – because the budget depends on several factors that are still uncertain.

PPS will look for efficiencies, as we have done in the past – yet, given the size of the gap, it is likely that we will need to make staff reductions. We will make sure staff have are kept informed about budget developments as soon as they occur.

We want your input – get involved: The Superintendent is eager for parent input before she submits her budget to the Board of Education. There will be a variety of ways you can share your input to the state and PPS budgets in the coming weeks.

You will have several ways to share suggestions about how we should tackle the short-fall. I will also work with our PTA and site council to help gather and communicate the perspectives of our school's parents and staff.

Key budget decision points:

January – E-mail budget suggestions to <u>www.budget.pps.k12.or.us</u>.

February – Superintendent releases her budget framework, which will describe priorities and trade-offs under consideration. Superintendent holds listening sessions with PPS employees and with the public to get feedback.

If you want to get involved in the state budget, you can join parents, teachers, students and other members of our community who care about K-12 education on **Monday Feb. 16 for a rally at the state Capitol.** For information about transportation, go to www.stand.org for more information.

March – By early March, the superintendent intends to present her Proposed Budget to the school board and to meet with principals to review the impact on staffing. At that time, you will receive more information what the Proposed Budget means for our school.

March to June – The school board deliberates, solicits public feedback and decides on a budget by May 15. The legislature will continue to deliberate on the state budget.



Allan Say, Caldecott Medal-winning author, to appear at A Children's Place Bookstore Saturday, January 24th at 1:00 PM

Portland's favorite Caldecott honored author and illustrator, Allan Say, will read his new book *Erika-san* this coming Saturday at A Children's Place Independent Bookstore, located at 4807 NE Fremont. He will also be able to sign copies of his books.

Erika-san is a beautiful story about a young girl who seeks an adventure in Japan and discovers more than she imagined. In her grandmother's house there is one Japanese print of a small house with lighted windows. Even as a small girl, Erika loved that picture. It will pull her through childhood, across vast oceans and modern cities, then into towns—older, quieter places—she has only ever dreamed about. But Erika cannot truly know what she will find there, among the rocky seacoasts, the rice paddies, the circle of mountains, and the class of children. For Erika-san, can Japan be all that she has imagined?

Buy Coffee in compostable bags to Support Richmond's Elm Trees

Richmond school's 20 American Dutch Elm trees need to be inoculated every 3 years to resist Dutch Elm Disease which can kill the beautiful trees which shade our school grounds. During inoculations in June of 2007, we used 800 microinjections of a fungicide recommended by foresters to protect our trees. The cost per injection was \$3.50 for a total of \$2800. For the next round of inoculations in 2010, prices and shipping costs are expected to be slightly higher.

To raise money for the inoculations, Save Our Elms, a 501c(3) non-profit, partners with Portland Roasting to sell delicious, freshly roasted coffee to the Richmond community. \$4.60 from every bag of regular coffee sold allows us to buy approximately 1.31 microinjectors. (Save Our Elms gets \$5.05 from every bag of decaf coffee, too!) The coffee is delicious, environmentally friendly and costs \$10/pound for regular and \$11/pound for decaf.

If you haven't tried the coffee yet, ground regular coffee is available for purchase in the office. The price is \$10 /pound (checks made to Save Our Elms, please.) You can look in the coffee basket on Patsy's counter for the variety you like and either give your money to Patsy or place it in the box marked "Save Our Elms" on the office front wall. I place orders every Thursday morning at 8 AM for whole bean, decaf, and additional ground coffee. For an order, please fill out an order form (some are usually available on the table in front of the office or on Richmond's website) indicating your coffee choice and whole bean or ground preference and attach payment. (Please note decaf coffee costs \$11.00 a pound.) Coffee from orders will be available in the office by the next afternoon and it will be held in Patsy's coffee drawer just for you. Patsy can retrieve this for you; she is a great supporter of this program. We accept donations as well.

Portland Roasting descriptions:

All coffees for Richmond are our Farm FriendlyTM Direct coffees because as important to us as the quality of our coffee is our social responsibility. We strongly believe that we can make a positive difference in the coffee world through direct, socially responsible coffee sourcing. We pay growers a premium for their coffee with 100% of the premium going to farm and community projects. All of these projects are designed to give back directly to the farmers - furthering the long term sustainable infrastructure.

Ethiopian – Kochere: This coffee is part of Project H.O.P.E., which stands for Hope and Opportunity for the People of Ethiopia. We are helping build a much needed community center for the Ethiopian farming community of Kochere to provide a common meeting place for educational purposes, as well as a vital medical dispensary for the people of Kochere.

French Organic - Certified organic; dark roast

Tanager's Song – an organic blend (Central American and Indonesian certified shade grown coffees), silky-rich and full-bodied with a caramel-like finish.

Papua New Guinea - a single varietal that is passive organic.

Farm Friendly Direct, SWP (Swiss Water Process) French Decaf – directly sourced, chemical free, dark roast.

Farm Friendly Direct, SWP (Swiss Water Process) Morning Decaf – directly sourced, chemical free, light roast.
