Dear PPS Community,

I know many of you are concerned about the deteriorating state of the economy and what the downturn means for PPS. I want to update you on our current budget outlook and let you know how you can help shape our budget.

To be straightforward, the situation is worsening. Despite past cuts and our efforts to manage resources responsibly, we face the likelihood of major budget reductions. At the same time, our schools have survived difficult times before -- we will survive these times, too. Even now, we have reasons to be hopeful.

Current budget situation

Here's what we know:

- Earlier this month, the state economist warned that state revenue for the rest of the current school year may drop by as much as \$300 million to \$600 million more than earlier estimates. This raises the possibility that PPS and other school districts may have to make cuts this school year.
- Many school districts are already considering shortening their school year. Portland Public Schools is awaiting more information from the governor's office -- likely to come late this month -- before we make decisions.
- Every indication we have now also points to a drop of more than \$1 billion for the next two-year state budget. (The next official state revenue forecast is due on Feb. 20.) All of these developments are bad news for our schools.

However, the federal economic recovery plan in Congress could reduce the impact of our anticipated state cuts and the number of positions we would otherwise be forced to eliminate as a result.

- The plan in Congress could provide tens of millions of dollars to PPS over the next two years for special education programs and schools serving a high percentage of students from low-income families (Title I). It would also help us fund school renovations and energy efficiency improvements in our school buildings.
- Proposed legislation also includes money to help Oregon and other states stabilize their budgets, and blunt cuts to education and other programs.

But these proposals are not yet law. And although the economic recovery plan could be a lifeline, it would not solve our budget problems.

Next steps for the PPS budget

Before I present the proposed 2009-10 budget to the Board of Education in March, I want to hear your best ideas on how we should prioritize our spending. Please turn the page for dates of events where you can share your budget feedback.

Here are the key dates in the process and how you can be involved:

- **Superintendent's Framework Message, Monday, Feb. 9.** I will discuss our key educational strategies and our approach to developing our budget at the Portland School Board meeting at 7 p.m. in the Blanchard Education Service Center, 501 N. Dixon. This meeting will be televised live on TV28 and rebroadcast later in the week.
- **Budget Listening Sessions, Feb. 12 and Feb. 26.** Hear an update on our evolving budget picture and share your ideas about how we can cut costs. These sessions will also be broadcast live on TV28.

Participating in the state budget process

Our budget depends on funds from the state. Sharing your voice with your representatives in Salem is another opportunity to weigh in on our budget and the funding available for schools across Oregon.

- **Presidents Day Rally, noon, Monday, Feb. 16, on the Capitol steps in Salem.** Many parents, PPS staff and members of our school board will attend the Presidents Day rally in Salem. (Learn more about transportation at www.stand.org.)
- Legislators are discussing how the state can stabilize funding and improve the outlook for schools and other services. <u>Tell them</u> what you think -- and encourage your friends and neighbors to share their views, too.

Moving forward

For more than a decade, Portland Public Schools has made cuts, saved money through operational changes and built up our reserves. We have tried to shield classrooms from the impact of budget cuts, but that has not always been possible. Now we face more budget reductions -- and potentially deeper shortfalls than we have seen before.

We're not alone. The economy is forcing public and private organizations across the nation to make painful cuts. But that's little consolation to the students and families who depend on us to deliver a great education.

In these difficult times, I will keep you informed as we move forward, whether the news is good or bad. I will also make sure you have as many opportunities as possible to inform our budget choices.

I will consider your input as I prepare our budget for next year. In this budget, I intend to prioritize choices that maintain our ability to prepare our students to read, to learn, to graduate and to get ready to succeed over the course of their lives.

Throughout these tough times, PPS will stay focused on the needs of our students no matter what uncertainties and distractions the coming months may bring. That's how our schools will emerge stronger when this crisis ends.

RICHMOND SCHOOL FOUNDATION (RSF)

Update upon completion of the fall parent pledge drive.

Congratulations parents, grandparents and friends of Richmond. The RSF wants to update you on your terrific participation in donating to the RSF and, in doing so, supporting smaller class sizes and our dual-immersion Japanese-English teaching model.

Your donations and participation have grown each year over the last three years. Pat yourselves on the back knowing that your donations to RSF go directly to increasing staffing at our school. You are contributing to a better education for your own children at Richmond. This year, we likely need to increase donations and participation again...especially with possible tax cuts due to the falling economy. It takes more to be above average...and Richmond has been 'exceptional' now 3 years in a row! (Oregon Department of Education Ratings.) As Benjamin Franklin said: "An investment in knowledge pays the best interest."

AMOUNT RAISED AND PARTICIPATION TO DATE: The next page has the update on participation, total raised and what it will do.

RSF TACHOMETER: Participation...we are aiming for 66% or higher this year.

RSF SPEEDOMETER: Total amount raised...last year we raised \$67,000. We are aiming for more this year as the economy will likely lead to more cuts in public education...if we don't make up the difference, no one else will.

RSF PIE-O-METER: Extra/additional staff funded...shows exactly how much more staff we have at our school due to your donations.

PARENT PLEDGE DRIVE: SIMPLE AND CONSISTENT MESSAGE: The <u>simple and consistent message from the RSF</u> remains the same and simple – the main vehicle for RSF funding is the semi-annual parent pledge drive:

TWICE A YEAR PARENT PLEDGE DRIVE.

FALL: In the fall, the drive is more general as the school specific staffing needs aren't clear until the spring when PPS staff allocations come out. While some parents have a more difficult time donating for an intangible need of 'more staff' in the fall, donations in the fall are as important as the spring. They get us jump started on donations and help you spread your own donations over the year, which for many parents, is an easier way to donate -- smaller amount more often rather than a larger amount less frequently.

SPRING: In the spring, we come back to you for the second half of the parent pledge drive. By then, we know what specific staffing needs Richmond will have. Many parents have an easier time donating for a tangible, known staff position. However, we all benefit from all donations whether done in the fall, spring or both.

DONATE THE EQUIVALENT OF ONE MONTH'S OF KINDERGARTEN TUITION TWICE-A-YEAR.

SUGGESTED AMOUNT: This year $$320 \times 2 = 640 .

WHY THIS AMOUNT: If our kindergarten parents can give this every month, we can all do it just twice-a-year. It is \$640 once, \$320 twice or \$64/month

ANY AMOUNT HELPS: And...of course any amount, no matter how large or small, makes a difference. It all adds up!

HOW TO DONATE:

ONLINE: More and more parents are donating online at <www.thinkschools.org>. Make sure you choose RICHMOND in the 'donate to' field.

TWICE-A-YEAR: Most parents donate by check or credit card twice-a-year.

MONTHLY IS EASIER FOR MANY: A growing number of parents have set up automatic monthly credit card donations. If everyone donated \$50/month from now à June, we'd have enough to fund an entire additional teacher for our children.
