"Here are strategies to help you get the most out of your time at different grade levels: To gain the most from conferences, prepare ahead. Talk with your child about what's going well and what

could be better. Does your child have a question they'd like you to ask? Write your questions down ahead of time so no critical topic is missed. If a significant event is affecting your child or family, let the



teachers know, so that they have a better understanding of your student. During the conference, take notes to help you remember dates, examples, or other important information. Tell the teacher your questions up front, so they can be sure to address them. but also be clear that you are ready to listen as well and to support both your student and the classroom."

Health News

Head lice policy at Richmond adheres to the PPS lice policy, which includes:

- Students found with nits remain at school.
- Students with live lice are sent home at the time discovered.
- Students with lice and/or nits receive treatment information.
- Whole school and/or classroom screenings are discouraged in all schools.

The PPS lice policy reflects recommendations from national experts such as Center for Disease Control (CDC) and the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP). Again, in accordance with PPS policy, there are no classroom screenings.

It is not the discretion of the schools to create a unique policy and practices; the schools must comply with the PPS policy.

As a parent and secretary, here is some 'mom-lice-advice'. First, make sure your children put their jackets and hats INSIDE their backpacks. Second, check your child's hair often. Daily or weekly checks help you catch it early and get on top of it. Third, whatever method you use to shampoo the live lice - the key is in 'nit-picking'. You *must* comb and comb and comb. You *must* get all eggs or nits out before they hatch into live lice. Lastly, diligently vacuuming everywhere, endless washing and drying of pillows, sheets, and blankets, bagging up toys, and cleaning car seats helps to reduce the chance of re-infestation.
