

Parking Sign Changes to be Implemented

After considerable delay, the city of Portland will be coming out in the next few weeks to install some new parking signs/restrictions surrounding the school. The goal will be to

create a greater number of short-term parking/drop-off spots for families to use rather than the parking lot or directly in front of the school. The plan

calls for these 15-minute zones on SE 41st between SE Sherman and SE Caruthers, on the east side of the street and on SE 42nd Avenue, south of SE Sherman on the west

Counselor's Corner

We ended the month with our successful spirit day activity, Japanes Day. The children looked wonderful in their traditional clothing, martial arts uniforms or Oya No Kai T-shirts. Our next spirit day will be crazy hair/hat day in March. More details about that to come later!



Our new peer mediation program, called Bulldog Brigade, was implemented this month after student volunteers received training in

December. We now have 4th and 5th graders on the playground during every recess to assist students with conflicts and clarification of game rules. So far many students have reported finding success when they seek out a peer helper.

The counseling classroom lessons in January focused on conflict resolution and conflict management. The students were taught a variety of skills and tools to use to solve their own problems. Books were shared and songs were sung to promote kindness and friendship, especially at the primary level.



In February our focus will be anti-bullying. Lessons will focus on identifying bullying behavior, especially the more subtle forms of bullying

lpha such as gossip, rumors and exclusion. The students will learn to defend themselves against bullying as well as be encouraged not to be a bystander, but instead to take a

stand against this hurtful behavior.

Clearly, there has been a lot of reading going on. As I watch some of the battles, it is amazing to see how well prepared and excited our students are to participate.

Siblings Entering the Lottery

If you have a child currently attending Richmond and have a sibling at home, please complete the following steps to ensure your entry into the lottery. As you know, siblings of current Richmond students who currently live within the PPS boundaries receive Step 1 preference for entrance into Richmond (this means you are ahead of the pack)!

- 1. Go online to schoolchoice@pps.net and fill out a lottery transfer application. Please do this between February 8 and March 15!
- 2. Come into the office to pick up the Richmond Statement of Understanding beginning February 8. The form is DUE BY March 15!
- 3. Return the form (and the envelope it came in so we can use it over and over again for your child) to the office by Friday, March 15.

Once you have completed all these steps, you just need to wait for your letter from the Enrollment and Transfer Center which will come approximately the first week of May.
