
A Message from Mr. Goldstein

Richmond wins the Regional Battle of the Books Competition!



The "Black Guardians of the Books" team took 1st place Saturday, March 2nd, at the Regional level of the **Battle of the Books**! Sixty teams were at Stafford Elementary ready to test their

memory and skills on the 16 books for the annual reading event. The Black Guardians easily took 4th place and moved into the final 16-team bracket. Two especially grueling battles entailed a total of eight overtime rounds to overcome the other highly talented teams for a 95-93 win . The next step for the Black Guardians of the Books is the State Championship - held Saturday, April 13th in Salem at Chemeketa Community College. Last year the Black Guardians of Books team scored 2nd in the state - barely loosing to the Oregon Episcopal School. Cheer this team to the top - they have worked hard reading and memorizing hundred's of infinitesimal details from each book.

Many Richmond families have asked about the requirements of supporting this effort. All you need to do is:

- Live within a 1-hour bus ride of one of the three schools, Richmond ES, Mt. Tabor MS, or Grant HS. You can check the Trimet Website at http://trimet.org/go/cgi-bin/plantrip.cgi to see the trip times.
- 2. The intern will need a bedroom to themselves. Bathrooms may be shared.
- 3. You must be able to host for 6 months (from either March 2013 until October 2013, or October 2013 until March 2014).
- 4. All members of your household accept and welcome the intern into your home and treat your intern as a member of the family.
- 5. Provide a comfortable, safe and supportive environment for your intern.

Counselor's Corner

In February, counseling lessons focused on Bullying. The characteristics of a bully were identified (asserting power and control, repetitive negative behavior towards another, targeting victims, purposeful action with intent to cause harm). Students also learned the four main types of bullying (physical, emotional, social and cyber) and the behaviors associated with each type. We discussed the role of the bystander and how this lack of action may contribute to the problem, as well as the characteristics of a victim.



Strategies for dealing with bullying behavior was discussed at length, building on the tools of conflict resolution and problem solving techniques taught in prior lessons. Our Word Of The Month, "Tolerance," (defined as a willingness to accept others for who they are, including their differences in beliefs, cultures and preferences) was woven into the conversation as well.



Our focus for March will be stress reduction. With our rigorous demands and expectations, especially as we enter into the high stakes time of the year of State benchmark exams, students can often demonstrate anxiety over performance or extra worrying about homework along with all the other activities on their plate. This stress can manifest itself in physical complaints, lack of sleep or strong emotional responses to minor

problems. The goal is for the students to learn to identify what stress is and possible stressors in their own lives, and then develop coping methods (such as relaxation strategies) for dealing with it.

A recent article from the website, Stand Up To Bullying.Net, correlated stress at home to bullying at school. It stated, "the way that parents react to economic issues and deal with stress, fear and anger during nerve-racking times impacts children tremendously. Financial stress can create uncertainty and tension in the home which, in turn, can create stress for children too.

When adults act inappropriately out of anger or fear, quickly losing their patience, speaking sharply or behaving disrespectfully towards family members, they increase the chance that their children will exhibit these same behaviors." As adults we all need to remember to be cognizant of how our tone, attitudes and reactions effect the children in our lives.
