Principal's News

Min Yasui Day

On February 24, 2016, the Oregon Senate and House unanimously passed legislation to honor the legacy of Minoru Yasui. Beginning this year on March 28th will be known as Minoru Yasui Day. The Richmond staff is currently reading <u>Stubborn</u> <u>Twig</u> by Laura Kessler which is the story of Masuo Yasui's family. This is a classic American story, a



story of immigrants making their way in a new land. Minoru Yasui traveled from Japan across the other Oregon Trail—the one that spanned the Pacific Ocean—in 1903. Working on the railroads, in a cannery, and as a houseboy before settling in Hood River, Oregon, he opened a store, raised a large family, and became one of the area's most successful orchardists. As Masuo's first-born son, Min, educated at the University of Oregon as a lawyer, protested the constraints and contradictions of being both Japanese and American-born which were put in place after the war. The US President gave Min's family the Medal of Honor this past November.

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Counselor's Corner

Dear Richmond Community,

Thank you for an amazing Rainbow Day! It was so much fun to see everyone in their colors, and we had almost 100% participation. We took a school-wide photo from the rooftop of our "rainbow" which came out wonderfully.

This month in our counseling curriculum we are covering a new and very important topic: **Growth mindset**. As I told your children, this is probably one of the most influential things I can teach them. Learning how to change your self-talk from a fixed mindset to a growth mindset is a crucial life skill. Growth mindset is about grit, resilience, perseverance, effort, and enjoying the process of learning.

One of the biggest factors that impact a child's mindset is praise. You have probably heard this information before in some form, that praising effort instead of the result is better for kids. As a third grader put it, "When my parents keep telling me I'm a good artist, then when I mess up on my drawing it makes me think I'm not a good artist anymore and that I can't ever make a mistake." The power of our words as parents and educators cannot be underestimated, and even though it is hard to do in real life, sometimes it is really important that we change the way we praise our children. "If parents want to give their children a gift, the best thing they can do is teach their children to love challenges, be intrigued by mistakes, enjoy effort, and keep on learning. That way, children don't have to be slaves to praise. They will have a life-long way to build and repair their own confidence." Carol Dweck, Ph. D., author of Mindset: the New Psychology of Success. (Her work started the growth mindset movement and can be found on her website www.mindsetonline.com.)

I wanted to share some resources for your further learning and also invite you to come into the counseling center to look at our visuals and books we are reading.

2016-2017 STAFFING

Dear Richmond Families:

Please return to the office by 3/18

As we look forward to next year, we would like to have input and feedback from our parents as we are planning staffing, curriculum, and our program for next year. We would like to know from families what works best for your child(ren), what doesn't have as high of a priority, and what could be different.

The dual immersion program requires a two-teacher model in which they each teach two groups of students every day with one partner teaching the curriculum in English and one partner teaching the curriculum in Japanese. This unique program comes with the language benefit but that does require us to "compact" what we teach in each language as well as with electives or specials we can offer. Therefore, we are not able to have everything within the students' day due to time limitations and state budget shortfalls. The district and/or the state does require that we have some PE and library classes as well as art and music via the art tax dollars. PTA has been supportive with Run for Richmond via science, technology, and fine arts enrichments as well as staffing support from the Richmond Foundation.

The <u>district decided</u> that K-5 schools must have the following: Counselors, secretaries, administrators, librarians based on their school size. Some struggling schools receive reading instructional support. Richmond does <u>not</u>, but for the past two years Richmond Foundation paid for a reading specialist. Foundation also supported the two-teacher model in addition to some support to PE. The <u>district</u> gives each school FTE (teacher positions) based on the number of students to one teacher. Currently it is 25.8 or 24.5 teachers for Richmond and our grade-level configuration requires 24 teachers.

The <u>Art Tax requires</u> us to have 1.5 positions of some type of arts. We have .5 music, .5 art, and .5 dance. The state and school board mandates that we teach a "core program" of literacy, math, writer's workshop, science/social studies, arts, library, health, ELD support, and PE, but there are no funds attached to some of these mandates such as PE.

The special education department assigns us a school psychologist, a learning center teacher, a speech-language pathologist, and an ESL teacher.

Consequently, we may not have a lot of choices next year, but I still value your input. Please prioritize the following program elements that you believe are important and which would be good reasons for students to be out of their classrooms. We value many more items than we can pay for, so please understand the need to be selective in our choices.

Please return this to the office by March 14 th so we can track how many we get from each of the different grade levels.
<u>Please rank your top 10 choices</u> in prior order as #1 being the highest and #11 the lowest of the following items. (These are in alphabetical order.)
Art currently half time
Digital/media via media specialist for half time AND
Library activities (Battle of the Books, Geography Bee, story time, and check out via classified specialist) for half time
Counselors, currently 1.5 counselors with weekly lessons, groups, student council, Bulldog Brigade, spirit day, and service/community projects
Curriculum support and tutoring in English (with reading specialist paid for the last two years by the Richmond Foundation) for one day beyond half time
Curriculum support and tutoring in Japanese (currently interns and Japanese TOSA). The interns pay to come to the US with support of homestays and bus passes via Oya No Kai
Music currently half time
Office support
Playground supervision – increase support other than teacher
Cafeteria supervision – increase support other than teacher
PE (physical education – an increase in the number of minutes per week is required by Senate Bill 3141, but no district allocation money is in the school model or student ratio)
