NAVIANCE

Naviance is an important tool that all students at Wilson will use for college and career planning, college application, and to fulfill graduation requirements. Naviance is a great research tool, with links to useful websites relating to colleges, financial aid, NCAA eligibility, and a resume-building tool. Students will also use Naviance to order official transcripts, prepare for requesting a counselor letter of recommendation, sign up for college visits at Wilson, and indicate your plans for after high school.

Login in at https://student.naviance.com/wilsonor or find the link at the Wilson website. To login, use your personal email address as user name and your 6-digit student ID number as password.

If you are unable to log in, visit the Counseling Office or the College Center for help.

THE APPLICATION: NAVIANCE STEPS

Use Naviance to research colleges and create a list of colleges you are interested in.

Once you have finalized your list:

- Enter the colleges you are applying to in Naviance. For each college, request official transcripts.
- For each college, indicate the type of application you are using (Common App or applying directly). If you are using SENDedu, talk to your counselor first.
- Check the website of each college you are applying to so that you understand the application requirements for each one.

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

Teachers and counselors require at least three weeks lead time before the due date to write you a letter—yours is not the only letter they will be writing!

Determine which of your schools require letters of recommendation. Private schools usually require 1-3 letters (from two teachers and one counselor). The process for requesting letters is different for counselors and teachers.

COUNSELOR LETTERS

To get a letter from your counselor, you MUST attend a Wilson Letter of Rec Workshop, offered in the spring and fall. You will receive your Letter of Rec packet at the workshop.

LETTER OF REC CHECKLIST

- Once all the forms are filled out and your resume is updated, make an appointment with your counselor about your college plans at least three weeks prior to your first application deadline.

TEACHER LETTERS

Teacher letters should come from teachers who know you well and have taught you in the past year; at least one should be from a core academic subject if possible.

Ask teachers directly for a letter of recommendation, use the blue form in the Letter of Rec packet. Teachers may ask you for an updated resume.

BE SURE TO THANK YOUR LETTER-WRITERS FOR THEIR TIME AND EFFORT! THIS IS ALSO A GOOD TIME TO ACKNOWLEDGE EVERYONE WHO HAS HELPED YOU GET TO THIS POINT IN LIFE—PARENTS, CAREGIVERS, FRIENDS, TEACHERS, COACHES.

THE FINAL STEPS: COMPLETING YOUR APPLICATION

- For Common App schools, match your Naviance account with your Common App account. Naviance will prompt you to match accounts.
- You must fill out the FERPA waiver in your Common App account to enable matching.
- If you apply to additional private colleges after meeting with your counselor, let them know which schools you are adding to ensure documents are sent to those schools.
- Send official SAT or ACT test to your schools (not all schools require test scores; you may have already asked that they be sent when you registered for your test) by logging in to your accounts at www.collegeboard.org and www.act.org
- A few weeks after submitting your application, check your account at each college to make sure that all documents have been received and look for directions on next steps!

PAYING FOR COLLEGE

Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE): A regional tuition-discount agreement that allows students from Oregon to enroll as nonresidents in 160+ participating public colleges and universities and pay 150% (or less) of the enrolling school's resident tuition. The average annual tuition savings for a WUE student is \$9,000. www.wiche.edu/wue

Ford Family Foundation Scholarship: In addition to a generous financial award, Ford Scholars receive academic guidance, leadership development, personal and professional support, and access to the Ford Family alumni network. Up to 125 renewable scholarships are awarded each year to students from Oregon. www.tfff.org/

Questbridge: Connects qualified students from low-income backgrounds to top colleges. The QuestBridge National College Match helps outstanding low-income high school seniors gain admission and full four-year scholarships to the nation's most selective colleges. The College Prep Scholars Program equips high-achieving high school juniors from low-income backgrounds with the knowledge, confidence, and resources to apply to top colleges. www.questbridge.org/
