A Resolution Declaring an Intent to Reimburse

RECITALS

- A. Portland Public Schools ("District") reasonably expects to borrow up to \$100 million to finance capital construction and improvement projects ("General Obligation Bond Projects") that will be included in the General Obligation Bond authorization the District expects to submit to its voters in the future.
- B. The District reasonably expects to borrow up to \$25 million to finance information technology projects ("IT Projects").
- C. The District expects to make expenditures from its available funds to pay for the costs of the General Obligation Bond Projects and the IT Projects before it finances those projects. Moreover, the District expects to reimburse those expenditures with proceeds of the future borrowings described above in Recitals A and B ("Reimbursement Borrowings").
- D. For interest on the Reimbursement Borrowings to be excludable from gross income, Section 1.150-2 of the Federal Income Tax Regulations requires that the District declare its intent to reimburse itself from the proceeds of the Reimbursement Borrowings no later than 60 days after the expenditures are made.
- E. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee reviewed this resolution on July 11, 2008, and recommends its approval by the Board of Education.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The District hereby declares its official intent pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Federal Income Tax Regulations to use proceeds of the Reimbursement Borrowings to reimburse the District for expenditures the District makes for the General Obligation Bond Projects and the IT Projects.
- 2. The Chief Financial Officer of the District or that official's designee are hereby authorized to make future declarations of intent to reimburse under Section 1.150-2 of the Federal Income Tax Regulations on behalf of the District and without further action by the Board of Education. All such future declarations shall be in writing and a copy of each declaration shall be maintained in the public records of the District.

Insurance Coverage Renewal and Payment of FY 2008-09 Premiums from District Self-Insurance Funds

RECITALS

- A. Portland Public Schools ("District") embarked on a comprehensive marketing effort with excess property, liability, workers' compensation and other insurance carriers.
- B. This marketing program was a team effort involving the District's Risk Management Department, insurance broker, and other District departments.
- C. This marketing effort resulted in savings and increased value to the District in insurance premium costs and policy coverage.
- D. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee reviewed this resolution on July 11, 2008, and recommends its approval by the Board of Education ("Board").

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board directs the Deputy Clerk to enter into and execute contracts negotiated by the Risk Management Department for excess property, liability, workers' compensation, and other insurance for FY 2008-09, with premiums for coverage and brokerage fees totaling \$916,626.
- 2. This expenditure will be charged to the Self-Insurance Fund 601.

RESOLUTION No. 3942

Contract Approval: Emergency Sinkhole Repair at Lincoln High School

RECITALS

- A. The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education ("Board") declare the existence of an Emergency at Lincoln High School as a sinkhole has developed under the track surface.
- B. Pursuant to ORS 279A.010(f), ORS 279B.080, and OAR 137-047-0280, incorporated by reference into Portland Public Schools Purchasing and Contracting Rules, the District may declare Emergency circumstances exist, which require prompt execution of a Public Contract for Emergency repair work.
- C. The necessary repair of the sinkhole at Lincoln High School constitutes an Emergency based on the following findings:
 - 1. The circumstances could not have been reasonably foreseen, as the sinkhole appeared from underground. The cause of the sinkhole is unknown at this time. Exploratory excavation is required.
 - 2. There is a substantial risk of loss, damage or interruption of services, and threat to property if the sinkhole continues to grow.
 - 3. If the situation is not immediately corrected, it could be a threat to public safety, cause potential utility problems, and require closing of the track, disrupting operations.

- 4. The prompt execution of a contract is required to remedy the condition. Therefore, a contract will be entered into via direct appointment.
- D. The Superintendent recommends that the Board authorize the Superintendent to award a Public Improvement Contract in response to the emergency without seeking competition, due to the extreme necessity of the situation. The estimated amount of the contract is \$50,000.

RESOLUTION

- The Board declares an Emergency pursuant to ORS 279B.080 at Lincoln High School as the property, students, and faculty are at risk, due to the unforeseen sinkhole, which occurred beneath the school's track.
- 2. The Board exempts the contract from the public bidding requirements of ORS 279C.335(1) and by this resolution authorizes the Deputy Clerk to enter into and execute an agreement in a form approved by General Counsel for the District for the repair of the track and its foundation.

RESOLUTION No. 3943

Installation for SB 479-Compliant Fluorescent High Bay Gym Lighting Fixtures

RECITALS

- A. In 2007, the Oregon State Legislature passed Senate Bill 479 ("SB 479"); on February 22, 2008, the Legislature revised the bill. SB 479 took effect on July 1, 2008, and prohibits the use of R-type metal halide or mercury vapor light bulbs in schools and requires that schools replace R-type metal halide or mercury vapor light bulbs with T-type metal halide or mercury vapor light bulbs or alternative lighting. SB 479 exempts stadium fields, outdoor athletic facilities, and "any other outdoor light fixtures except outdoor light fixtures in covered areas used by persons for recreational or educational activities."
- B. Portland Public Schools ("District") has R-type metal halide or mercury vapor light bulbs in the majority of its school gyms, multi-purpose rooms, covered play areas, and other miscellaneous interior spaces.
- C. To comply with SB 479, the District will replace R-type metal halide or mercury vapor light bulbs with alternative fluorescent lighting for the following reasons:
 - 1. Fluorescent lighting can provide energy savings of 50% or more.
 - 2. Fluorescent lighting can be instantly turned on/off, which allows for further energy savings and reduced custodian set-up time by eliminating the 15-minute "warm-up" associated with R-type metal halide and mercury vapor lighting.
 - 3. Fluorescent lighting output does not degrade rapidly over time, providing better, brighter light for occupants, and in some cases, doubling the light levels in District gyms.
 - 4. Fluorescent lighting eliminates the annoying "buzzing" sound associated with metal halide and mercury vapor lighting.
 - 5. Fluorescent lighting retrofits under SB 479 can be funded by the District's SB 1149 public purpose funds and Business Energy Tax Credits ("BETCs").

- 6. Twenty fluorescent lighting retrofits the District implemented in-house in 2006 and 2007 are a big success and occupants are extremely happy.
- D. The District has conducted a lighting analysis of all of R-type metal halide or mercury vapor light bulbs in our facilities.
- E. The District has issued Invitation to Bid No. 08-1161 to purchase over 1,000 fluorescent T8 high-bay gym fixtures, lamps, and ballasts required for this project. Purchasing fixtures separately eliminates additional mark-ups charged by installation contractors on fixtures. Bids were due on July 9, 2008.
- F. Installation of the fixtures will begin late Summer 2008 and be completed by December 31, 2008. Estimated installation cost is \$250,000-\$300,000.
- G. Because this project requires work at over 60 different schools (with many different ceiling types that will likely call for customized solutions), a short implementation timeline, close coordination with the District-selected fixture supplier, and scheduling around gym and Civic Use of Buildings use, the District wishes to use a Request for Proposals ("RFP") process to hire a contractor with sufficient experience and expertise to perform the installation and complete it within the set time frame. The District desires to complete the solicitation and construction contracting process as promptly as possible to allow for quality and timely work to be performed by the end of the year.
- H. ORS 279C.335(2) authorizes the Board of Education ("Board") to exempt certain public contracts or classes of contracts from the competitive bidding process otherwise required by the District's Public Contract Rules upon certain findings.
- I. Based upon the following findings pursuant to ORS 279C.335(2), the Board concludes that an exemption from competitive bidding is justified pursuant to the Public Contracting Code found in ORS 279C:
 - The Board finds that this contract exemption is unlikely to encourage favoritism in the award of public contracts because it will be publicly advertised and therefore open to all qualified contractors. The Board also finds that this contract exemption is unlikely to substantially diminish competition for public contracts because the contract will be awarded through an alternative competitive process.
 - 2. The Board further finds that allowing this contract exemption will result in substantial cost savings to District. Selecting a qualified contractor for this specialized work will save District funds by avoiding further costs and delays that could be caused by a contractor with insufficient experience. Further, the alternative competitive process will ensure that the District receives qualified work at a premium value.
 - 3. In addition, the RFP process will enable the District to consider factors in addition to price, enabling the District to ensure selection of a contractor that is familiar with the SB 1149 program requirements and BETCs, has the capacity to take on a project of this scale, will be able to complete the project by December 31, 2008, will be able to work seamlessly with the fixture supplier, and has the expertise to handle customized applications in a quality and timely fashion.
- J. In making the above findings, the Board considered the following factors pursuant to ORS 279C.330:
 - Operational, budget, and financial data: Because the work will be conducted in three months, the Board requires a contractor who has the capacity to expeditiously and safely complete the work by December 31, 2008. An experienced lighting installation

contractor will also minimize disruption of the school and reduce oversight costs. The energy savings associated with this project enables the District to utilize grant and tax credit funds, thereby minimizing the need for District dollars. Total estimated cost of construction is \$250,000-300,000.

- Public benefits: Expeditious completion of the project means that the District gyms will be out of commission for a short period of time. Gyms are regularly used by the community. In addition, upon successful completion of this project, the District's utility costs for gyms will be reduced by 50%. The public will also benefit from the expected cost savings.
- 3. Value engineering: This process will enable the contractor to work with the District to minimize project costs. By using the RFP process, the District will be able to negotiate with the selected installer and incorporate any proposed cost savings, as well as address specialty situations that could not be anticipated and specified upfront.
- 4. Specialized expertise required: This project requires a contractor familiar with HID-to-fluorescent lighting retrofits and one familiar with a variety of ceiling types and materials.
- Public safety: Selection of a contractor with experience in HID-to-fluorescent lighting retrofits will ensure the highest level of student and public safety. The RFP process will enable the District to select a contractor with experience and expertise working in a school environment without impacting or endangering students and public users of District facilities.
- 6. Market conditions: Existing market conditions within the construction industry should result in a very competitive price for the work. In addition, because of the large scale of this project, multiple qualified contractors in the area have already expressed interest in the project and will ensure a competitive environment.
- 7. Technical complexity: The contractor must have the expertise to handle various retrofit applications and work on a wide variety of ceiling types. The contractor will also be responsible for scheduling multiple deliveries of District pre-purchased fixtures. The contractor must work seamlessly with the fixtures supplier to assure and track timely, correct, and complete, deliveries and related billings.
- 8. Funding sources: The District will fund this project through SB 1149 funds and Business Energy Tax Credits.
- 9. The Finance, Audit, and Operations Committee reviewed this resolution on July 11, 2008, and recommends its approval by the Board.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board hereby exempts this contract from the competitive bidding requirements of ORS Chapter 279C and the Public Contracting Rules.
- The Board directs that the contract be let through an alternative competitive process consisting of an RFP as set forth in the District's Public Contracting and Purchasing Rules, with the work being performed under the direction of Facilities and Asset Management.

- E. The District intends to award a contract to the highest-ranking firm as a result of the RFP.
- F. The District's Public Contracting Rules require Board approval for award of all contracts over \$25,000, unless the Board grants a special exception to the rule delegating such authority. Given the meeting schedule of the Board, an exemption to this rule is necessary to permit expeditious contract award in order to begin the required community engagement work as quickly as possible.
- G. The Student Support and Community Relations Committee reviewed this issue on September 8, 2008 and recommends adoption by the Board. The Committee also recommends Board directors be actively involved in the development and implementation of the community engagement process.

Resolution to Designate the Portland Public Schools District Security Services Department as a Law Enforcement Agency

RECITALS

- A. As required by ORS 181.539, ORS 326.607, and OAR 581-022-1730, Portland Public Schools ("District") initiated Board of Education ("Board") Policy 5.10.140-P on November 11, 2003, to further protect the safety and welfare of students and staff by requiring fingerprinting and criminal history verification of
 - 1. All employees;
 - 2. All contractors whether full or part-time and the employees of any contractor whether full or part time who may have direct, unsupervised contact with students; and
 - Volunteers for the District who the District determines may have direct, unsupervised contact with students.
- B. In 2004, the District was granted access to the Law Enforcement Data System ("LEDS") to screen potential employees, contractors, and volunteers, with the understanding that the District would pursue Law Enforcement Agency ("LEA") status for its Security Services Department. The District must now complete this process of becoming an LEA in order to continuing having access to the LEDS system. By changing the designation and allowing the continued direct access to LEDS, the District will save approximately \$25,000 annually.
- C. In order to resolve this status and to ensure Security Services has the ability to continue to screen potential employees and contractors for criminal histories by utilizing the LEDS, the District must officially designate the Security Services as a Law Enforcement Agency. This LEA designation will not change how Security Services operates, nor will it allow Security Services to gain greater authority other than the continued ability to use the LEDS for the express purpose of protecting students and staff.
- D. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee reviewed this issue on September 16, 2008, and recommend adoption of this resolution by the Board.

Resolution in Support of Measure 26-94: The Portland Children's Levy

RECITALS

- A. Measure 26-94: The Portland Children's Levy would continue to finance the Children's Investment Fund to support proven programs designed to help children arrive at school ready to learn, provide safe and constructive after school alternatives for kids, help foster children and prevent child abuse and neglect and family violence.
- B. Measure 26-94 will continue to help over 16,000 of Portland's needlest children, 50% of whom live in extreme poverty with a household income at or below the Federal Poverty Level.
- C. Measure 26-94 is solely dedicated to helping children in Portland. The Children's Investment Fund can only be used for
 - Child abuse prevention and intervention: addressing juvenile crime, school failure, drug and alcohol abuse and homeless youth;
 - Early childhood programs: making childcare more affordable and preparing children for success in school;
 - After school, summer and mentoring programs: promoting academic achievement, reducing the number of juveniles victimized by crime and increasing graduation rates; and
 - Children in foster care programs: helping foster children succeed who have been abused and neglected.
- D. The Children's Investment Fund has proven itself accountable to the taxpayers of the City of Portland by ensuring that
 - Programs funded must be cost effective and have a proven record of success;
 - The Investment fund is subject to oversight by a citizen committee;
 - The Investment fund is subject to annual audits; and
 - Administrative costs cannot exceed 5%.

RESOLUTION

The Board of Education supports Measure 26-94 because of its dedication to supporting Portland's children and its success in providing proven programs designed to help children arrive at school ready to learn, provide safe and constructive after school alternatives for kids, help foster children and prevent child abuse and neglect and family violence.

Resolution in Opposition to Measure 58:
Statewide Prohibition of Teaching Public School Students in Language other than English

RECITALS

- A. Measure 58 would prohibit teaching public school students who are not native English speakers in a language other than English for more than one year in grades K-4, for one-and-a-half years in grades 5-8, and for 2 years in high school.
- B. Measure 58 would set time limits and program restrictions on the teaching of English rather than allowing local school leaders and teachers to design English as a Second Language ("ESL") programs for students to learn enough English to succeed in class. Measure 58 would institute a one-size-fits-all approach to teaching that is not consistent with current best practices.
- C. Of the 4,600 Portland Public Schools ("District") students who are English Language Learners, 90% are taught in mainstream classes in English with ESL support. Under Measure 58, 3,450 of those students would no longer be allowed ESL support to learn English.
- D Local school districts are held accountable by state and federal law to teach English language skills and to transition students from the ESL program when their English proficiency meets the criteria under the State English Language Proficiency Assessment that evaluates their readiness to exit the program.
- E. The State of Oregon estimates that it could cost more than \$100 million a year statewide for new programs to meet federal government requirements if Measure 58 passes. The District's share of that cost estimate could total more than \$12 million a year.
- F. Measure 58's requirements are contrary to research which shows that children who become literate in their native language learn English more quickly and become proficient in English at a higher rate.
- G. Teaching English Language Learners in their native language allows students to keep up in their other subjects while learning English, resulting in greater success in school and higher graduation rates.
- H. Measure 58 contains no exception for language immersion programs such as those in Spanish, Japanese, Chinese and Russian offered by the District. Under this measure, a native Japanese speaker would have to leave the Japanese immersion program after one or two years because of the ban on teaching English Language Learners in their native language, while native English speakers could remain in the program. In effect, the Measure would restrict the ability of English Language Learners to participate in highly successful language immersion programs.
- I. Measure 58 contains no exceptions for supporting English Language Learners with learning disabilities.

RESOLUTION

The Board of Education opposes Measure 58 because

- It restricts the district's ability to identify, develop, and utilize the best methods available to teach students English so that they can succeed in school:
- It restricts the ability of English language learners to participate in highly successful language immersion programs, with the discriminatory result that only native English speakers will have

the opportunity to become bilingual through full participation in those programs; It prohibits the district from supporting students in learning content in their native language while they become proficient in English, thus reducing their ability to succeed in school and increasing the likelihood that they will leave school without graduating; and The costs of developing new programs to meet the requirements of federal law within the strictures of Measure 58 are not funded by this Measure.

RESOLUTION No. 3983

Resolution in Opposition to Measure 59: Federal Income Tax Deductibility

RECITALS

- A. K-12 public education in Oregon receives the majority of its funding through a direct appropriation from the state legislature in the form of the State School Fund, generally comprising over 40% of the total state general fund.
- B. The state relies on personal income taxes for almost 90% of all state revenues, making public services, including public education, highly sensitive to any changes in personal income tax collections.
- C. Measure 59 proposes to change the amount of federal income taxes that can be deducted from an individual taxpayer's Oregon taxable income from a limit of about \$5,600 to the entire amount of federal taxes paid.
- D. The state's Financial Estimate Committee, which prepares estimated fiscal impact statements for ballot measures states that Measure 59 would only benefit about 25% of Oregon taxpayers. The Oregon Center for Public Policy issued a separate financial impact study indicating that only 22% of Oregon taxpayers would see a savings and that households with annual incomes exceeding \$82,200 would receive 97% of the savings under this measure.
- E. The changes proposed in Measure 59 are estimated by the Legislative Revenue Office to result in a \$1.244 billion loss of state revenue in the 2009-11 biennium (equivalent to a 9% reduction in the state budget) and a \$2.268 billion reduction in the 2011-13 biennium (equivalent to a 14% reduction in the state budget).
- F. Because Measure 59 would dramatically reduce the overall state budget, it would also likely result in a direct reduction in revenues for human services programs, public safety and public education, including K-12 education.

RESOLUTION

The Board of Education opposes the passage of Measure 59 and its efforts to dramatically reduce revenues available for public education in Oregon.

Resolution in Opposition to Measure 60: Statewide Merit Pay

RECITALS

- A. Measure 60 would impose a statewide mandate requiring all school districts to institute a new teacher compensation program, short-circuiting the existing local collective bargaining process.
- B. Measure 60 lacks the necessary definitions and clarifications that would help local school boards thoroughly understand and effectively implement such a statewide mandate. Measure 60 does not define "classroom performance" and could lead to new testing requirements as school districts attempt to measure this generic term.
- C. Measure 60 could result in discouraging collaboration among teams of teachers in schools and instead foster competition to increase test scores.
- D. Measure 60 would not allow teachers to be compensated based on years of classroom experience or postgraduate education or certification and would force school districts to lay off teachers based on an undefined criterion of "classroom performance."
- E. Measure 60 imposes a single, unproven criterion to boost classroom performance merit pay while ignoring many other approaches such as pre-kindergarten programs; full day kindergarten; before and after school programs, summer school, a longer school year; longer instructional time per day; smaller class sizes; greater professional development; and strong teacher evaluation programs that could enhance classroom performance.
- F. Measure 60 would not allow school districts to provide cost of living increases to teachers, likely leading to Oregon falling behind other states in providing competitive wages.
- G. Measure 60 would redefine our current teacher contract negotiations and likely sideline many of the important issues currently under discussion as we struggle to define "classroom performance" and institute an entirely new and unproven compensation program.
- H. The official state fiscal impact committee has estimated that Measure 60 would require additional spending of between \$30 million and \$72 million statewide in the first year and between \$30 million and \$60 million statewide in subsequent years without raising additional revenues to compensate local districts.

RESOLUTION

The Board of Education opposes the passage of Measure 60 and its imposition of an unproven statewide teacher compensation system in place of locally negotiated employment contracts.

High School Intensive Supports Curriculum Materials Adoption

- A. A strong core curriculum is a deliberate and thoughtful plan for teaching and learning in our schools, pre-kindergarten through grade 12, to provide every student a challenging and meaningful education. For Portland Public Schools ("District"), a core curriculum includes four key elements:
 - 1. Standards and benchmarks aligned with state and national standards defining both the academic skills and the course content students should master.
 - 2. Instructional strategies for our teachers to use in the classroom, based on research and data on how students learn best.
 - 3. Curriculum materials for teachers and students, such as textbooks, guides, novel sets, lab materials and technology.
 - 4. Common assessments and assignments to allow schools to periodically evaluate students' progress against the standards.
- B. An aligned, demanding curriculum ensures every student at every school has the opportunity and access to a rigorous education that prepares them for a career and college. Core curriculum is a hallmark of high-performing school districts across the nation that are raising achievement for all students and closing the achievement gap.
- C. Intensive support materials correlate with the District's core curriculum. The use of these materials supports access to rigorous academic content for all students. These materials are used in conjunction with the core materials and will be available to high school teachers and students who have a need for intensive academic support.
- D. A collaborative process was used to make the selection of the support materials. The parameters were to do a thorough review of the standards, an extensive review of the research, and a review of the correlation to the District's required curriculum. The process included input and evaluation using a scoring guide by a composite of people in the District. The professionals involved in the evaluation of materials were special education teachers from the high schools, special education Teachers on Special Assignment ("TOSAs"), general education TOSAs from Curriculum and Instruction, professionals from the Bilingual / ESL Department and administrative staff with expertise in curriculum. After the review of the materials and tabulation of the scoring guides, the Special Education Department is recommending programs that will assist students needing intensive support, reduce the gap that exists between different subgroups of students, and provide access to a rigorous curriculum that correlates with the District's core curriculum.
- E. Funds for curriculum materials were specifically identified in the November 2006 "local option" property tax levy.
- F. The Superintendent has reviewed the adoption process and supports the proposed materials for students needing intensive instruction.
- G. The Student Achievement Committee reviewed this resolution on October 9, 2008 and recommends its adoption by the Board of Education ("Board").

RESOLUTION

1. The Board accepts the Superintendent's recommendation to adopt and purchase the following curriculum materials for High School Intensive Supports:

RESOLUTION No. 3986

<u>Criteria to Determine the Order of Rebuilding and Renovation of</u> PPS School Buildings to Create 21st Century Schools

- A. The physical assessment of Portland Public Schools ("District") school facilities completed in 2008 by Magellan Inc., a national consulting firm experienced in evaluating the condition of school facilities, produced comprehensive data about the condition of each school building, and provided the basis for embarking on a school renovation and rebuilding program. The District's buildings are older than most comparable school districts, many are at or near the end of their useful life, most of the major systems in many buildings require replacement, and to continue to patch and repair them is not cost effective.
- B. Most of the District's schools were designed in a different era, and the configuration of most schools is not ideally suited to teaching and learning in the 21st century.

- C. In May 2008, the Board of Education ("Board") committed in principle to the rebuilding and renovation of the District's school buildings. The Board anticipates that the work will be carried out in phases to create 21st century learning environments in all of the District's school facilities.
- D. A broad, comprehensive set of guiding principles has emerged from the Facilities Assessment process, beyond a ranking of buildings that need the greatest attention to bring them into good repair. These guiding principles serve as a vision for creating facilities that serve the community, building partnerships in how schools are used, designing learning spaces that inspire and challenge students, investing in sustainable practices and learning, making technology improvements, assuring that learning spaces are flexible and adaptable for different programs and learning styles over time, engaging the community in creating new learning environments, and tying development of schools to community development.
- E. The Facilities Assessment identified deficiencies in all school facilities. The list of deficiencies can be addressed by short-term actions and by a long-term program of rebuilding and renovation. The District will endeavor to address the greatest short-term needs to ensure that all schools meet "warm, safe, and dry" standards, and to make near-term expenditures to address certain program requirements, such as needed improvements in technology, capacity for physical education, and modifications to support more effective implementation of the K-8 program in many of the District's school facilities.
- F. The criteria in this resolution serve as a framework for determining the order in which a long-term school rebuilding and renovation program should proceed to meet the objective of creating 21st century learning environments. In order to go beyond a "worst first" approach in prioritizing this work, a broader range of factors needs to be considered that will impact where work is performed.
- G. The following criteria are the key factors to be considered in developing the priorities for the District's long-range rebuilding program:
 - 1. <u>Balance by Grade Level</u>: Work needs to be performed across all levels of schools (high school, middle school, K-8, elementary)
 - 2. <u>City Development Plans/Projects</u>: As the City of Portland implements policies to encourage family-friendly development around school sites and "20 minute walkable neighborhoods," the District will work with the City to plan strategically for future growth. This City/District cooperative planning is expected to provide opportunities to retain existing families as well as attract new families to the District, and may be a factor in placing a school higher on the list (for example, if a major family housing development or increased housing density is proposed for an area).
 - 3. <u>Enrollment</u>: Enrollment is the number of students assigned to a building. Schools can be over-enrolled, under-enrolled or at a manageable capacity. In order to "right size" the school, the District can apply several tools: analyzing transfer patterns and making adjustments, evaluating boundary changes to balance enrollment between adjacent schools, and increasing the physical capacity of the school. The choice of how to address the issue of enrollment may impact the order in which facilities work proceeds.
 - 4. <u>Enrollment Enhancement Opportunity</u>: A new or fully modernized school may be used as an opportunity to attract students back to a neighborhood with a low "capture rate."
 - 5. <u>Environmental Considerations</u>: There may be specific environmental considerations that affect the order in which work is undertaken among all of our schools. For example, further testing might reveal water intrusion of an unacceptable and irreparable level at a school.

- 6. <u>Facility Condition Index</u>: The facility condition index ("FCI") is an industry standard for comparing building condition. The FCIs developed by Magellan included the actual physical condition of buildings and included the costs needed to bring each school up to the educational specification levels set by a broad-based team of District instructional leaders. FCI does not include the costs needed to create 21st century schools, only the costs needed to provide upgrades within the current facility structure.
- 7. <u>Fulfilling a Commitment</u>: Honoring the commitments about facility improvements that the District has made in the past may be considered in determining the order of work.
- 8. <u>Geographic Distribution</u>: School renovation work should be distributed across the city to assure that there is equity in school improvements.
- 9. <u>Historic Structure Deterioration</u>: A few District schools have been formally designated as historic structures. An increase in the rate of deterioration might need a quick response that moves a facility ahead in the schedule.
- 10. <u>Large Impact</u>: The renovation or addition of a facility that is anticipated to have a large impact on another school, an entire community or a major part of the city, in addition to meeting other criteria, may be a determining factor in placing a school higher on the list.
- 11. <u>Partnership Opportunities</u>: Partnerships can be financial, technical, joint use and/or joint development and can take quite a while to nurture. The opportunity for a partnership that has been developed and funded may mean that a particular facility needs renovation or construction ahead of schedule or that a delay is warranted while the partnership is formalized. Equity of access to quality partnerships will be a key consideration.
- 12. <u>Program Requirements</u>: A new District program imperative might require a major facility renovation in order to offer that academic program in a quality way. These can be handled under either short-term work or long-term work, depending on the amount of renovation required. For example, deciding to offer pre-K in every school has implications on building size. Again, equity of access to programs and support for programs will be a key consideration.
- 13. <u>Safety and Security</u>: Assuring that all schools within the District are "warm, safe, and dry" is always a priority. But various safety and security considerations might impact the District's renovation order because of the volume or nature of concerns at a particular site that could only be addressed with major rebuilding or renovation.
- 14. <u>Temporary Space</u>: Most school rebuilding and renovation work will require students to be temporarily relocated while work is being done on their school. For those schools, the District will need to balance the work being performed at any one time across the city in order to have temporary space (with limited travel time for students) available to support the work being performed.
- 15. <u>Unite a Divided Campus</u>: Several District schools have significant portions of their school enrollment in buildings that are not close to each other.
- H. It is expected that a work plan for school rebuilding and renovations will clearly identify how the criteria have been applied, explaining the rationale and mix of considerations that were utilized in prioritizing the work. Consistent with that approach, it is expected that the application of criteria to formulate a plan for each phase of work will need to be re-examined to assure that the ranking generated in one phase is still appropriate for successive phases as needs and conditions change.

I. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee reviewed these criteria on October 3, 2008, and unanimously recommends adoption of this resolution by the Board.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board adopts the criteria defined in this resolution, and directs the Superintendent to use these criteria to develop a long-range plan to renovate and rebuild District school facilities, and to develop a proposal for the first phase of work to be undertaken.
- In applying these criteria, the Board directs that the FCI is initially the primary criterion to rank schools selected for rebuilding and renovation; other criteria are modifiers to this criterion. The Board also directs that renovations to accommodate Program Requirements and to address Enrollment are criteria to be heavily weighted in developing the ranking, along with any major Safety and Security improvements needed in specific school facilities.
- The Board expects that each phase of the plan will be designed with the understanding that the
 combination of equity, expressed as Geographic Distribution, and practicality, expressed as
 Temporary Space, will have significant impact on the order of schools selected for a particular
 phase of work.
- 4. The Board does not intend to adopt these criteria to provide an arithmetic scoring formula for determining the order of school rebuilding and renovation. Rather, the criteria are to be used in relation to one another, to weigh and to balance competing considerations in developing a cost-effective, equitable, and workable rebuilding and renovation plan. The Board expects that each phase of the work will involve the interplay of dynamic factors and that careful analysis and judgment will be utilized in balancing these criteria.
- 5. The Board directs that the rebuild and renovation list developed with these criteria will be used to inform the short-term plan to address immediate facility needs. The Board further directs the Superintendent to prepare options for short-term action for Board consideration.

RESOLUTION No. 3987

Adopting Guiding Principles to Use for Developing and Implementing a 21st Century School Facilities Plan

- A. When Portland Public Schools ("District") embarked on a physical assessment of its school facilities to guide the development of a long-range facilities plan, it began the process with consideration of a broad spectrum of factors that affect, or are affected by, school facilities renovations. Important considerations such as current and future population trends, enrollment projections, the educational adequacy of the District's school facilities measured against a set of standards, and the condition of each school facility were included in the initial assessment design.
- B. During the assessment process, the Board of Education ("Board") acknowledged that a careful and strategically crafted facilities plan must consider several critical factors:
 - 1. Preparing students for the 21st century and providing 21st century school facilities to meet those demands;
 - 2. Defining expectations for education outcomes;

- 3. Selecting programs that attract and keep students in the District;
- 4. Creating flexibility in school and program design to adapt to changing needs;
- 5. Identifying required work to make school facilities warm, safe, and dry;
- 6. Selecting renovations and new schools to address the most serious deficiencies;
- 7. Making schools available for community use; and
- 8. Determining the priority order of school facility fixes.
- C. The District also engaged in internal and community dialogues about learning in the 21st century, how to prepare students for the demands of a global life, and expectations for education outcomes. A picture of a 21st century learning environment emerged from this broad-based dialogue and the experiences of other school districts.
- D. The public was given many ways to provide comments about the future of the District's school facilities, and hundreds of residents participated in two city-wide meetings and four "quadrant meetings" in each part of the District. In addition, information was advertised online, with an opportunity for the public to comment and ask questions as the assessment process was completed. A specifically designed online survey proved to be a popular vehicle for obtaining community views.
- E. Defining the vision of what the District expects to achieve aids the process of determining how the broad and complex array of factors that were raised in this process would be addressed in developing a long-range facilities plan. A vision statement, called "Guiding Principles," was initially crafted during the ReShape Schools Summit that launched the facilities assessment process in May 2007, and was tested in the course of the extensive discussions described above.
- F. The following Guiding Principles are a reflection of District and community values, and will serve as the foundation in determining how the facilities plan is shaped, funding is acquired, and expenditures are made. The Guiding Principles will, in particular, inform the design process at each school site, as the Portland community, District staff, and architects work together to design 21st century schools for our children.
- G. Guiding Principles:
 - 1. <u>Community: True Partnership</u>

We must create facilities that serve the community and that enlist the community in service to children and youth. This means engaging the community in a genuine dialogue about schools as learning places and as community places. It means partnerships at all levels – government, business and neighborhood – to create better school facilities and to provide the services students and families need. It means working together to develop community assets that support life-long learning and wellness and that help to knit our community together. And it means honoring diversity and ensuring equity.

2. <u>Teaching and Learning: Creative Forever</u>

We must create learning environments that nurture, inspire and challenge our students: places that allow learning to flow beyond the walls — into the community and around the globe, and at the same time provide students with something unique and irreplaceable within those walls. This means creating places where students can discover and develop their unique talents—and learn to value learning and to expect to go on learning all of their lives. And it means graduating students who are as creative as their kindergarten selves.

3. Sustainability: Think Green, Build Green, Teach Green

We must invest in sustainable facilities, not only because they are better for our planet, but also because they are better for our children and youth. This means green buildings that are healthier places to be and that serve as engaging and effective learning tools. It means that the schools actively teach both students and the community at large about environmental responsibility, and model what they teach.

4. Adapting to Change: Continuously

We must create learning environments that will serve our students well in the future, which is now. This means ubiquitous technology in school. It means understanding our students' other learning media and networks, so we can teach them more effectively and help them to be safe and responsible out there. It means creating a level playing field by ensuring equitable access to technology. And it means flexible and adaptable spaces and a nimble technology infrastructure.

5. Making This Happen: Together

We can create the kinds of learning environments we want for our children. Places that reflect community needs, interests and values and community engagement. This means looking ahead and all around: master planning; connecting the development of schools to community development; and rethinking what school buildings do and when they do it. It means being collaborative and creative. It means involving all the right leaders and each of our school communities. It means involving students in meaningful ways, and making that a learning experience. It means engaging a dynamic and ongoing dialogue. And it means working together to establish stable, sustainable funding for school facilities.

H. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee reviewed these Guiding Principles on October 3, 2008, and recommends adoption of this resolution by the Board to aid in future planning and decision-making.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board affirms and supports the Guiding Principles set out in this resolution.
- 2. The Board directs the Superintendent to use these Guiding Principles in developing a long-range plan to rebuild and renovate District school buildings to create 21st century schools. The Board further directs that these Guiding Principles be the foundation for design and planning work at each school site.

High School Economics Social Studies Curriculum Materials Adoption

RECITALS

- A. A strong core curriculum is a deliberate and thoughtful plan for teaching and learning in our schools, pre-kindergarten to grade 12, to provide every student a challenging and meaningful education. For Portland Public Schools ("District"), a core curriculum includes four key elements:
 - Standards and benchmarks aligned with state and national standards defining both the academic skills and the course content students should master:
 - 2. Instructional strategies for our teachers to use in the classroom, based on research and data on how students learn best;
 - 3. Curriculum materials for teachers and students, such as textbooks, guides, novel sets, lab materials and technology; and
 - 4. Common assessments and assignments to allow schools to periodically evaluate students' progress against the standards.
- B. An aligned, demanding curriculum ensures every student at every school has the opportunity and access to a rigorous education that prepares them for a career and college. Core curriculum is a hallmark of high-performing school districts across the nation that are raising achievement for all students and closing the achievement gap.
- C. The Curriculum Materials Adoption Advisory Committee ("CMAAC") for grades 9-12 social studies made a recommendation to the Board of Education ("Board") in May 2007 to postpone the adoption of materials for the semester economics class until teachers could pilot materials and evaluate them. During the 2007-08 school year, four teachers used and evaluated two sets of materials. The teachers convened to evaluate them based on the CMAAC criteria and are now making a recommendation to the Board.
- D. The proposed adoption materials meet the criteria set out by the Oregon Department of Education ("ODE"). A Notification of District Independent Textbook Adoption will be filed with the ODE since the materials are more current than those on the approved state adoption list.
- E. The proposed adoption materials will cost approximately \$250,000. Funds for curriculum materials were specifically identified in the November 2006 "local option" property tax levy.
- F. The Superintendent has reviewed the adoption process and supports the proposed materials for economics.
- G. The Student Achievement Committee reviewed this resolution on October 9, 2008, and recommends adoption by the Board.

RESOLUTION

A Resolution Naming Wells Fargo Bank, N.A., as a Depository for the Funds of the Portland Public School District

- A. On June 12, 2006, the Board of Education ("Board") passed Resolution No. 3521, assigning the duties of the Clerk of the School District No. 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon D/B/A Portland Public Schools (the "District") to Heidi Franklin, Chief Financial Officer.
- B. Resolution No. 3521 "granted the authority to sign contracts and other legal documents for the District" to the Clerk and in her absence and at "other times deemed necessary and appropriate" the same authority to Cathy Mincberg, Chief Operating Officer.
- C. Resolution No. 3522 provided that "effective May 1, 2006, and until otherwise ordered by the Board, Heidi Franklin, Chief Financial Officer, and Cathy Mincberg, Chief Operating Officer, are hereby designated the person(s) to be custodian(s) of school funds."
- D. Resolution No. 3522 further provided that "all funds belonging to this District shall be received by or in the name of said designee(s) and shall be deposited in her name as Chief Financial Officer or Chief Operating Officer serving as administrator(s) for all Portland Public Schools, in such banks within the counties in which the district is located as the Board deems safe and proper depositories for District funds, as evidenced by a resolution of the Board in effect at the time of such deposit."
- E. WHEREAS, the District now desires to pass a resolution to name Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. as a depository of the funds of the District;
- F. WHEREAS, the District further desires that the District's funds should be deposited into deposit accounts in the name of the District;
- G. WHEREAS, the District desires to supplement and/or modify Resolutions 3521 and 3522 as provided below;
- H. WHEREAS, the Finance, Audit and Operations Committee has reviewed this resolution and recommends that the Board of Education adopt it to continue current banking operations.

(each such designated officer an "Officer"), is individually authorized to: (a) open or close one or more deposit and/or securities accounts (the "Accounts") with Wells Fargo Bank, National Association ("Bank") (which account shall be in the name of the District); (b) execute and deliver in the District's name such agreement(s) regarding the Accounts and the services related thereto as Bank may from time to time require; (c) authorize and execute transactions on the Accounts, including, without limitation, (i) signing checks and other instruments withdrawing funds from the Accounts, including those payable to cash or to persons who sign them, (ii) requesting funds transfers by Bank to and from the Accounts, (iii) entering into arrangements for the processing of automated clearing house ("ACH") debit entries and/or ACH credit entries to and from the Accounts, and (iv) endorsing on behalf of the District, and otherwise negotiating, checks and other items payable to the District; (d) incur overdrafts and other obligations in the Accounts at Bank in connection with any of the products, services, or activities authorized by these resolutions; and (e) invest the District's funds on such terms and conditions as such Officer deems appropriate;
RESOLVED that any one of the following of the District's officers [designate titles only];

(each such designated officer a "Limited Officer"), is authorized to: i) request funds transfers by Bank to and from the Accounts, (ii) enter into arrangements for the processing of automated clearing house ("ACH") debit entries and/or ACH credit entries to and from the Accounts.

RESOLUTION No. 3993

Designation of Real Property as Surplus at the Mallory Site (4231 NE Mallory)

- A. The Board of Education ("Board") seeks to ensure that the physical assets of Portland Public Schools ("District") are supporting in the most productive way possible our core mission of educating Portland students.
- B. The District has limitations on the financial resources available to support its educational programs and seeks new sources of revenue to support its programs and activities.
- C. The District owns an undeveloped 10,000 square foot vacant property consisting of two buildable lots described as 4231 NE Mallory (Lots 1 & 2, Block 11, Albina Homestead Addition, City of Portland) and known as the Mallory Site.
- D. The Benson High School Building Trades Program ("Benson Program") offers training in residential home construction to Benson students through the design and hands-on participation in the construction of a compete home over a two-year period.
- E. The Benson Program has built nine homes on sites purchased by the District for the use of the program over the last 20 years.
- F. On September 15, 2008, by way of Resolution No. 3962, the Board authorized the sale of the last Benson Program site and the recently completed home on the Mallory Site.
- G. The Superintendent recommends to the Board that the Mallory Site be declared surplus real property so that the site may be used for the construction of two additional Benson Program houses and each house subsequently and expeditiously sold on the residential housing market subject to final sale approval by the Board.
- H. The Superintendent makes the following report pursuant to Board Policy 8.70.040-P in support of her recommendation that the Board declare the Mallory Site surplus real property:
 - 1. <u>Notice</u>: The Board; the City of Portland, Oregon; Multnomah County, Oregon; and the King Neighborhood Association were notified on May 16, 2008, of the Superintendent's intent to recommend that the Mallory Site be declared surplus real property by the Board for use in the Benson Program.
 - 2. <u>Public Input Opportunity</u>: District staff attended the June 11, 2008, King Neighborhood Association meeting and presented the Superintendent's recommendation that the Mallory Site be declared surplus and used in the Benson Program.

3. <u>Summary of Factors Considered</u>:

- a. <u>Program/Enrollment Factors</u>: The Mallory Site is a 10,000 square foot undeveloped vacant parcel. It is not adjacent to a District school. Because of its small size and geographic location, it is not needed for District school program use.
- b. <u>Financial Factors</u>: The current value of this site is in the \$200,000 to \$250,000 range. The use of the Mallory Site for the Benson Program will save the District an equivalent or higher cash outlay for the purchase of two new building lots for the program.
- c. <u>Public Input Analysis</u>: District staff attended the June 11, 2008, King Neighborhood Association meeting and presented the Superintendent's proposal to recommend that the Mallory Site be declared surplus and used in the Benson Building Trades Program.

The Neighborhood Association was supportive of the redevelopment of the Mallory Site in housing but expressed the following concerns:

- i. The large tree in the northeast corner of the Site should be retained.
- ii. Neighborhood residents within a two-block radius of the Site should receive notice via a leaflet or other means describing the future use and construction on this Site.
- iii. The Site should be fenced during the construction period to provide for neighborhood safety.

Based on the above, public input supports the intent and direction of the Superintendent's recommendation for the use and disposal of the Mallory Site. The Benson Program has indicated that it can address the neighborhood concerns as to fencing and local notice and is willing to consider all reasonable design alternatives that will retain the existing tree in the northeast corner of the site.

- 4. Governmental Agency Option To Purchase: The City of Portland and Multnomah County were notified on May 16, 2008, of the District's intent to declare the Mallory Site surplus and of their opportunity to declare an intent to purchase the Mallory Site within 60 days from date of notice; neither government has responded that they have an interest in the purchase of the Mallory Site.
- I. The Finance, Audit, and Operations Committee has reviewed this recommendation and recommends Board approval.

RESOLUTION

- 1, The Board finds the Mallory Site (Lots 1 & 2, Block 11, Albina Homestead Addition, City of Portland) is no longer needed by the District and that following the completion of the Benson Program homes on the separate lots that comprise the Mallory Site, that each such lot is declared a surplus real property qualified for disposal under Board Policy 8.70.040-P.
- 2. The Board authorizes the Superintendent or her designee to offer the completed homes built on the Mallory Site for sale on the Portland residential housing market through the services of a licensed real estate broker and authorizes the Deputy Clerk to enter into and execute such

Director Wynde moved adoption of the above-numbered items. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed unanimously (vote: 6-yes; 0-no. Student Representative Stickler voting yes, unofficial).

Authorizing an Amendment to the Intergovernmental Agreement between Multnomah County and Portland Public Schools for the Lease of Space at the Blanchard Education Service Center ("BESC") and Authorizing the Purchase of Certain Space at the BESC from Multnomah County

- A. The Board of Education ("Board") in Resolution No. 05619 on September 27, 1999 and Multnomah County in Resolution No. 99-189 approved an Intergovernmental Agreement ("IGA") between Multnomah County ("County") and Portland Public Schools ("District") for a 99-year lease of 46,307 square feet of space in the BESC, the District's headquarters offices and maintenance facility, located on land known as the Flint Street parcel, and certain other considerations, for a one-time payment of \$3,500,000 as documented in the IGA dated June 8, 2000.
- B. Multnomah County arranged this lease to consolidate County operations, preferably at BESC to provide the District the benefit of additional needed revenue in order to address a serious budget shortfall of available education resources.
- C. The County has reduced its operations located at the BESC over the last two years and is no longer using approximately 8,000 square feet of leased space located on the L-1 level of the BESC.
- D. The District is in the process of consolidating and reorganizing aspects of its administrative operations to focus on the District's instructional programs, necessitating greater proximity of its instructional departments, promoting effective internal communications and collaboration, and ultimately providing improved services to its schools. Additional space in the BESC is needed to support these efforts.
- E. The County finds itself in a serious budget shortfall position, and the on-going partnership between the District and the County motivates action by the District to assist the County in reducing County costs and, by doing so, providing additional resources for needed County programs.
- F. Should the District ever desire to buy out all of the County leasehold to facilitate a sale of BESC, the original lease terms require that the appraised value of the leased space at that time be the basis for the buy-out. As it is reasonable to assume that the value of the property will continue to increase, an earlier acquisition of any portion of the space from the County would mean the District would avoid paying the higher price for the same space at some later date.
- G. The County pays the District its share of the BESC operating costs based on the percentage of the building it leases, currently 14.4%. This annual payment has typically been approximately \$150,000. The County's share of BESC operating costs currently paid by the County will be reduced by approximately 2.5% based on the reduced area of the BESC leased by the County.
- H. County and District staffs have reached agreement on the terms of a proposal to acquire back the County leased space located on the L-1 level of the BESC as follows:
 - 1. The agreed upon value of the L-1 space is \$800,000. It was valued at some \$552,000 in 2000, and its value has increased approximately 5% a year, based on recent appraisals of the BESC.
 - 2. The District will make annual amortized payments of up to \$150,000 to cover principal and interest. Depending on the interest rate as determined below, it will take approximately six years to fully pay for the repurchase of the space.

- 3. The interest rate will be variable, and established by calculating the average of the monthly interest rates for the Local Government Investment Pool for the 12 months preceding the month the annual payment is made. The amount of the last payment will depend on the variation in the interest rate over the term.
- 4. All other terms and conditions of the IGA will remain in full force and effect except that the County's proportionate share of the BESC operating expenses will be reduced based on the new reduced amount of floor space leased.
- 5. The County will remove its furnishings and other materials currently located in the L-1 space at its own expense by December 1.
- 6. The District agrees to allow the County the continued use of the information technology equipment closet located in the L-1 area for its data and phone infrastructure needs during the duration of the IGA for the lease of space at BESC by the County or until such time as the County removes its data and phone equipment from this location.
- I. The Finance, Audit, and Operations Committee of the Board has reviewed this action and unanimously recommends Board approval.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board approves the purchase of a portion of the Multnomah County-leased area in BESC as described above, and authorizes the Deputy Clerk to enter into and execute an amendment to the June 8, 2000 IGA between Multnomah County and the District, in a form consistent with the above recitals and approved by General Counsel for the District.
- The Board acknowledges that the first payment of \$150,000 will be made on June 15, 2009, to the County, which will be appropriately authorized in a forthcoming resolution to amend the FY 2008-09 Adopted Budget.

RESOLUTION No. 3997

Authorizing a Short-Term Lease of the Smith Facility to the Riverdale School District During the Construction of a New Riverdale Elementary School Facility

- A. Smith School was closed in June 2005 and the facility is held by Portland Public Schools ("District") for potential future educational use, including its use as a swing space to carry out District programs when schools are undergoing extensive capital renovations.
- B. The District subsequently offered the building for lease on a short-term basis and at market rent rates; no proposals were made that were acceptable to the District. As a result, the District did not further market the property.
- C. The Riverdale School District ("Riverdale") has proposed leasing for 14 months to two years the Smith facility during the reconstruction of its elementary (K-8) facility beginning in either June 2009 or in June 2010, contingent on the start date for construction, construction completion, and the requirements of their academic calendar.

- D. The District anticipates that Smith School will not be needed as swing space to accommodate the District's school programs when other schools are undergoing renovation prior to September 2012.
- E. Riverdale and District staffs have negotiated the following terms for the proposed lease of the Smith facility:
 - 1. Option One: Lease of the facility from June 2009 though August 2010 at \$37,500/month, with an option to extend through January 2011 at \$40,500/month with a second option to extend though June 2011 at \$42,500/month.
 - 2. Option Two: Lease of the facility from June 2010 though August 2011 at \$40,500/month, with an option to extend though January 2012 at \$42,500/month with a second option to extend though June 2012 at \$44,500/month.
 - Riverdale is responsible for all the costs of all utilities, custodial services, and minor
 maintenance of the building; all costs of obtaining and complying with all required
 permits; and the costs of any improvements to Smith School needed by Riverdale for the
 operation of their program subject to District approval.
 - 4. The fields and grounds of Smith School will be open to community use weekends and holidays and after school on school days and to organized activities under permits from the District and City of Portland Parks and Recreation during these hours, except when Riverdale has scheduled after-school use on the grounds.
 - 5. The lease is contingent on voter approval of the Riverdale bond proposal for the construction of a new elementary school and on approval by the City of Portland of any required land use approvals by March 15, 2009, in order to provide adequate notice to the District that Riverdale will begin occupancy.
 - 6. Riverdale agrees that it shall not recruit K-8 District students during the term of the lease.
- F. District and Riverdale staffs attended the October 13, 2008 meeting of the Ash Creek Neighborhood Association Meeting to explain the proposed Smith School lease and to provide an opportunity for neighborhood input. The consensus of the meeting supported the short-term lease of this facility to Riverdale provided that Riverdale furnishes information on and addresses transportation issues as required by the City of Portland in its land use approval processes.
- G. The Finance, Audit, and Operations Committee of the Board of Education ("Board") has reviewed this action and unanimously recommends approval.

RESOLUTION

The Board authorizes the Deputy Clerk to enter into and execute a lease with the Riverdale School District consistent with the above recitals and in a form approved by General Counsel for the District.

Resolution Denying the Application for Emerald Charter School

RECITALS

- A. On July 15, 2008, Emerald Charter School ("Applicant") submitted its application for a public charter school.
- B. On July 28, 2008, Portland Public Schools ("District") staff notified Applicant that the application was incomplete and provided a checklist of completeness criteria.
- C. On August 14, 2008, Applicant resubmitted its application for a public charter school.
- D. On September 2, 2008, District staff notified Applicant that the application was determined to be complete and that the notification of completeness was not a determination of the merits of the application.
- E. On October 13, 2008, Applicant was notified that the public hearing of its charter school application was scheduled for October 31, 2008.
- F. Prior to the public hearing, District staff conducted a review of Applicant's written proposal. The reviewers used an evaluation document that is consistent with Oregon statutes and rules and district policies regarding charter schools. The document requires applicants to provide information in six areas:
 - 1. General information about the proposal and the capacity of the applicant to undertake the public charter school;
 - 2. The mission statement and purposes define the character of the charter school;
 - 3. The educational program, the "heart" of the charter proposal;
 - 4. Supports for learning that a public charter school would offer that will lead to increased student performance;
 - 5. Accountability for performance of students and the school as a whole; and
 - 6. A solid financial, business, and organizational plan that provides the structure for successful implementation and continuation of the charter school.
- G. The staff review recommended that the Applicant be encouraged to withdraw its application and resubmit it after completing further analysis, planning, and development. If the Applicant decided not to withdraw the application, the review panel recommended that, prior to any action by the Board of Education ("Board"), the Applicant be given the opportunity to respond to the questions listed in the review. A copy of the review is on file at the District office.
- H. The Board's Subcommittee on Charter Schools ("Subcomittee") held a meeting October 23, 2008, to discuss the public hearing process and the staff review. An electronic copy of the staff review of Applicant's proposal was sent to Applicant the next day, and paper copies were available at the meeting.
- I. The Subcommittee held a public hearing of Applicant's proposal on October 31, 2008.
- J. On November 17, 2008, after considering the staff review and the additional information gathered from the public hearing and from Applicant's written responses to questions, Superintendent

Carole Smith recommended to the Subcommittee that Applicant withdraw the application for further planning and development. If Applicant chooses not to withdraw the application, the Superintendent recommended that the Board deny Applicant's proposal and give reasons for the denial.

K. On November 17, 2008, the Subcommittee met to deliberate on its recommendation to the full Board. After careful consideration of the information in Applicant's proposal, from the public hearing, in Applicant's written responses to questions, and in the Superintendent's recommendation, the Subcommittee determined that the proposal does not meet the District's Charter Schools Application Review Criteria and voted 3-0 to recommend that the application be denied. The Subcommittee based its recommendation on concerns about the capability of the Applicant to create new, innovative and more flexible ways of educating children within the public school system; the demonstrated financial stability of the public charter school and the detailed plan for financial operations of a new school; and whether there may be significant, adverse impacts on the quality of public education for District students that are not outweighed by the value of the proposed charter school.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board denies Applicant's charter school proposal for the following reasons:
 - a. The capability of the Applicant to create new, innovative and more flexible ways of educating children within the public school system, and to encourage the use of different and innovative learning methods (ORS 338.055(5), Board Policy 6.70.010).
 - At the public hearing and in the application, Applicant noted similarities with other charter schools and district options. The Applicant has not shown that the proposed charter school offers an instructional program not already available within the District's school system.
 - ii. Programs incorporating inquiry-based teaching, a science/math focus, community-based learning, and/or multi-age classrooms/looping can be found in many N/NE Portland neighborhood schools, as well as in District focus options and charter schools such as Creative Science School, Sunnyside Environmental School, Winterhaven, the Odyssey program at Hayhurst, Emerson Charter School, Opal Charter School, and Portland Village Charter School.
 - iii. Applicant notes on page 11 of its application that, "[l]argely, the students are coming from focus option or charter schools within the District." The table on page 12 of the application indicates, however, that, of the families surveyed, 38 potential students would come from charter and focus options, and 37 would come from neighborhood schools. Thirty of these 37 students are from the Jefferson, Roosevelt, and Grant clusters. There are no data to indicate the cultural, racial, or socio-economic diversity of these respondents or of the marketing efforts.
 - b. The demonstrated financial stability of the public charter school or the detailed plan for financial operations of a new school (ORS 338.055(2)(b), Board Policy 6.70.010).
 - i. It is not clear how the Applicant calculated projected private grants of \$10,000 in year one, and \$15,000 each in years two and three, and \$100 per-student per year in fundraising. At the hearing, the Applicant testified that it was confident that it could secure these funds, but there are no committed funds from grantors at this point. Aspects of the school's operation that would rely upon unsecured fundraising/grant monies include some of the school's information technology, aid for families that cannot pay full-day kindergarten tuition, and counseling services.

- ii. Applicant indicated that it had budgeted \$10/hour for two hours of custodial service per day for a 6,000 7,000 square foot building. At the hearing, Applicant indicated that its staff would primarily be responsible for classroom cleaning and removal of spills/messes during the school day. This does not appear to be a sustainable plan. The Applicant also indicated that it would plan to recruit a large portion of its staff from Lewis and Clark College, which provides an inquiry-focused teacher education program. However, Lewis and Clark College currently places nearly 100% of its graduates into teaching positions, so it is unclear whether the Applicant would be able to recruit teachers from this program at the proposed budgeted salary.
- iii. There were several instances in the application process in which the Applicant displayed a lack of understanding of charter school law and/or procedures. For instance, Applicant initially budgeted kindergartners at 1.0 ADM, instead of 0.5 ADM. At the hearing, the Applicant noted that it would refer students and families whose first language was other than English or Spanish to the District for services. Actually, the proposed charter school would be responsible to provide or contract for English Language Learner services. Additionally, Applicant indicated that it would plan to receive Title I finds to cover the costs of meals to free-and-reduced lunch ("FRL") qualified students. A K-8 charter school can only receive Title I funds if its student population is 40% (or more) FRL qualified. Applicant's proposed approach for providing meals to low-income students does not indicate a solid plan for providing breakfast and lunch to these students.
- c. Whether the value of the public charter school is outweighed by any directly identifiable, significant and adverse impact on the quality of the public education of students residing in the school district in which the public charter school will be located (ORS 338.055(2)(f), Board Policy 6.70.010).
 - i. Applicant anticipates locating the proposed charter school in the N/NE Portland area. Two charter schools serving grades K-8 and one charter middle school are already located in the N/NE Portland quadrant. These schools currently serve 619 students in grades K-8 and would serve over 800 students in these grades once fully expanded. Another applicant, currently appealing to the State Board of Education for sponsorship, proposes to locate in the N/NE Portland quadrant, as well, which could add another 240 students to the charter system, for a total potential K-8 charter enrollment of nearly 1,050 students in the N/NE Portland area alone. Adding Emerald Charter School would bring this total to 1,230 students or the equivalent of three to four neighborhood schools. Such a concentration of charter schools in this area would put significant pressure on existing, including District, schools.
 - ii. Families in the N/NE quadrant of the city completed 88 of the 97 parental surveys, and 17% of these surveys were completed by members of the same household. The data collection methodology described in the application indicates that most efforts were concentrated in the N/NE Portland area. However, the data do not indicate whether there are children in the family, how many children (if any), their ages, or where they attend school currently.

2. The Board directs District staff to

a. Provide the Applicant with documentation detailing reasons the application does not meet the District's criteria for authorization of a charter school, including suggestions for remediation, if any, and to

Amendment to Disposition of Surplus Real Property Policy B 8.70.040-P

RESOLUTION

- A. The Board of Education ("Board") for Portland Public Schools ("District") reviewed recommendations by the Finance, Audit and Operations Committee to revise the Disposition of Surplus Real Property policy. Per District Policy (1.70.020-P), the Board is required to place any new policy or updates to existing District policies on the District website for a 21-day public review. Having fulfilled this obligation and having received public input on the proposed policy amendment, the Board supports the proposed policy language for adoption.
- B. This policy and its related Administrative Directive issued subsequent to adoption by the Superintendent will replace the 2002 version of the policy which focused on reducing the number of unused or underused real property assets. Since the goals outlined in 2002 were largely achieved, the disposition of real property in the future will be the result of unique circumstances and will occur infrequently.
- C. Under the 2002 version of the policy, the Real Estate Trust was to be given the opportunity to serve as the owner and developer of surplus property. However, the District never exercised that option of the policy and has no desire to do so now.
- D. These new revisions streamline the policy while retaining the essential features of the existing policy: public notice and review, public comment, and a requirement that a thorough analysis be completed relating to any recommendation to dispose of real property.
- E. In approving the proposed revisions, the Board affirms that given projected long-term future growth of District and the Portland population, and the scarcity of land in the City of Portland, retaining and improving the District's portfolio of real property assets is a prudent long-term strategy that supports the District's mission and the public interest.

PROPOSED POLICY:

B 8.70.040-P Disposition of Surplus Real Property

Under ORS 332.155, the Portland Public School District may lease, sell and convey all property of the District that is not, in the judgment of the School Board, required for school purposes.

The Portland Public School Board affirmatively acknowledges its support for managing the District's real property consistent with the District's mission and the public interest.

The Superintendent shall recommend to the Board the disposal of any property that is not essential to the District's mission now or in the future. An action declaring the property surplus must be based on a thorough analysis presented by the Superintendent to the School Board. The Board shall make the final determination as to which properties are surplus.

The Superintendent shall use an open and inclusive public input process in the development of any final recommendation to declare property surplus, and the findings from that process shall be provided to the Board prior to any Board decision. This public process will be in addition to the Board's public hearing to declare property surplus.

The policy directs the following:

- (1) <u>Superintendent's Surplus Real Property Recommendation</u>: The Superintendent shall develop and adopt administrative directives establishing a process for developing recommendations to the Board on surplus properties. The process shall include at a minimum the following components:
 - (a) Notification of the Portland Public School Board,
 - (b) Notification to the City and County, and other public agencies as appropriate, providing an opportunity to purchase the property, and notification to the local neighborhood association, and the public at large.
 - (c) A minimum of 60 days for public response or comment.
 - (d) A summary of the factors considered in the development of the recommendation.
- (2) <u>Surplus Property Recommendations-Public Hearing</u>: At least one public hearing shall be held by the Board prior to declaring any real property or proportion thereof surplus.
- (3) <u>Sale process</u>: Once the property is declared surplus by the Board, the Superintendent, or such persons as may be designated by the Superintendent, shall establish and conduct a process for sale or other conveyance of the property.

The Superintendent will market and negotiate a sale or other conveyance of the property and bring a recommended agreement to the Board for the Board's review and approval.

(4) <u>Disposition of Surplus Property Suited For A Particular User Or Use</u>: Whenever the Board finds that a parcel of Surplus Property is especially suited for use by a particular user or use which would be beneficial to the community, the Board may declare the property surplus, identify the community benefit, and authorize the Superintendent to negotiate a sales agreement or other conveyance for this property subject to Board approval.

Numbers 4024 through 4026

During the Committee of the Whole, Director Regan moved adoption of Board Action 4024. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed unanimously (vote: 7-yes, 0-no; Student Representative Stickler voting yes, unofficial).

Director Wynde moved adoption of the above-numbered items, with the exception of Board Action 4024. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed unanimously (vote: 7-yes, 0-no; Student Representative Stickler voting yes, unofficial).

Resolution Denying the Revised Application for Emerald Charter School

RECITALS

- A. On July 15, 2008, Emerald Charter School ("Applicant") submitted its application for a public charter school.
- B. On July 28, 2008, Portland Public Schools ("District") staff notified Applicant that the application was incomplete and provided a checklist of completeness criteria.
- C. On August 14, 2008, Applicant resubmitted its application for a public charter school.
- D. On September 2, 2008, District staff notified Applicant that the application was determined to be complete and that the notification of completeness was not a determination of the merits of the application.
- E. On October 13, 2008, District staff notified Applicant that the public hearing of its charter school application was scheduled for October 31, 2008.
- F. Prior to the public hearing, District staff conducted a review of Applicant's written proposal. The reviewers used an evaluation document that is consistent with Oregon statutes and rules and District policies regarding charter schools. The document requires applicants to provide information in six areas.
 - 1. General information about the proposal and the capacity of the applicant to undertake the public charter school.
 - 2. The mission statement and purposes defining the character of the charter school.
 - 3. The educational program, the "heart" of the charter proposal.
 - 4. Supports for learning that a public charter school would offer that will lead to increased student performance.
 - 5. Accountability for performance of students and the school as a whole.
 - 6. A solid financial, business, and organizational plan that provides the structure for successful implementation and continuation of the charter school.
- G. District staff recommended that the Applicant withdraw its application and resubmit it after completing further analysis, planning, and development. If the Applicant decided not to withdraw, the review panel recommended that prior to any action by the Board of Education ("Board") the Applicant be given the opportunity to respond to questions listed in the review. A copy of the review is on file at the District office.
- H. On October 23, 2008, the Board's Subcommittee on Charter Schools ("Subcommittee") held a meeting to discuss the public hearing process and the staff review. An electronic copy of the staff review of Applicant's proposal was sent to Applicant the next day and paper copies were available at the meeting.
- I. On October 31, 2008, the Subcommittee held a public hearing on Applicant's proposal.
- J. On November 17, 2008, after considering the staff review, the additional information gathered from the public hearing, and the Applicant's written responses to questions, Superintendent

Carole Smith recommended to the Subcommittee that Applicant withdraw the application for further planning and development. If Applicant chose not to withdraw the application, the Superintendent recommended that the Board deny Applicant's proposal and give reasons for the denial.

- K. Also on November 17, 2008, the Subcommittee met in a work session to deliberate on its recommendation to the full Board. After careful consideration of the information in Applicant's proposal, in the public hearing, in Applicant's written responses to questions, and in the Superintendent's recommendation, the Subcommittee determined that the proposal did not meet the District's Charter Schools Application Review Criteria and voted 3-0 to recommend that the application be denied. The Subcommittee based its recommendation on concerns about the Applicant's lack of evidence of different and innovative learning methods; the lack of demonstrated, sustainable support for the public charter school by teachers, parents, students, and other community members; the lack of evidence of the demonstrated financial stability of the public charter school and the detailed plan for financial operations; and the lack of evidence as to whether the value of the public charter school would be outweighed by any directly identifiable, significant and adverse impact on the quality of the public education of students residing in the District.
- L. On November 24, 2008, by way of Resolution No. 4003, the Board voted 6-0 (one member absent; Student Representative voting yes, unofficial) to deny Applicant's proposal.
- M. On December 6, 2008, District staff provided Applicant documentation detailing the reasons its application did not meet the District's criteria for authorization of a charter school, and offering suggestions for remediation and information about the process and timeline for submitting a revised application for consideration by the Board, should Applicant choose to do so.
- N. On January 7, 2009, Applicant submitted responses to the District's suggestions for revisions.
- O. The Subcommittee, District staff conducted a review of Applicant's revised proposal. The review was consistent with Oregon statutes and rules and District policies regarding charter schools. The Subcommittee recommends that the Board deny Emerald Charter School's revised application subject to specific conditions stated in the review.
- P. On January 16, 2009, the Subcommittee met to deliberate on its recommendation to the full Board. After careful consideration of the information in Applicant's revised proposal and in the staff review, the Subcommittee determined that the proposal does not meet the District's criteria for authorization of a charter school and voted 3-0 to recommend that the application be denied. At that meeting, Applicant received a copy of the staff review of Applicant's revised proposal.

RESOLUTION

- 1. For these reasons and consistent with ORS 338.055 and District Policy 6.70.010-P, adopted September 11, 2000, and last amended August 8, 2005, the Board denies Applicant's charter school proposal.
 - a. The application, comments received at the public hearing, and responses to suggestions for revisions to the application do not provide detail satisfactory to the District that the Applicant will create new, innovative, and more flexible ways of educating children in the public school system, or will encourage the use of different and innovative learning methods.
 - i. While the Applicant identifies many similarities and differences with other existing District schools and programs, it has not provided sufficient evidence that its proposed charter school offers an instructional program or options not already available within the District's school system.

- b. The application, comments received at the public hearing, and responses to suggestions for revisions to the application do not provide detail satisfactory to the District that the Applicant has demonstrated financial stability or a satisfactory detailed plan for financial operations of a new school.
 - i. In its revised application, the Applicant specifies one committed donor for technology equipment and addresses tuition for kindergarten and referral to reduced-rate counseling services, but does not explain how private grants of \$10,000 in Year One, and \$15,000 each in Years Two and Three were projected. The Applicant also does not indicate commitments from specific donors to help meet this figure. The current economic crisis and the instability of state ADM funding and private grants make this of paramount importance.
 - ii. The Applicant indicates that it will start with a small teaching staff of individuals who have expressed interest in working at Emerald and taking on extra duties such as classroom maintenance. However, no documentation (letters of commitment, etc.) from these interested individuals was received as part of the revised application nor were any specifics provided.
 - iii. Custodial staff responsibilities time (two hours per day) appears to be understated and wages appear to be budgeted below market value.
- c. The application, comments received at the public hearing, and responses to suggestions for revisions to the application do not provide detail satisfactory to the District that the Applicant has demonstrated that the value of its proposed charter school is outweighed by any directly identifiable, significant, and adverse impact on the quality of the public education of students residing in the District.
 - Applicant's referenced survey data (which cannot be verified) indicates which schools parents would place their children in if Emerald were not available, but does not address the impact on District schools if the students in the potential pool enroll in Emerald.
 - ii. District staff recommended that the Applicant provide an analysis of the original survey response data that would indicate whether there were children in the families of those respondents, how many children (if any), their ages, and where they currently attend school. The Applicant does not address this question based on the survey information already provided to the District, but rather, referenced a new December 2008 survey that was not provided to District staff. Therefore, the information cannot be qualified or verified from either the original survey or the new one.
 - iii. Two charter schools serving grades K-8 and one charter middle school are already located in the N/NE quadrant of Portland. These schools currently serve nearly 620 students in grades K-8 and would serve over 800 students once fully expanded. Ivy Charter School, recently approved for sponsorship by the State Board of Education, has proposed to locate in the N/NE quadrant, as well, which could add another 240 students to the charter system, for a total potential K-8 charter enrollment of nearly 1,050 students in N/NE Portland alone. Adding Emerald Charter School would bring this total to 1,230 students, or the equivalent of three to four neighborhood schools. A concentration of charter schools in this area would put significant stress on neighborhood enrollment in other existing schools.

Numbers 4032 through 4035

During the Committee of the Whole, Director Wynde moved adoption of Board Action 4032. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed 6-1 (6-yes, 1-no; Director Regan voting no and Student Representative Stickler absent).

During the Committee of the Whole, Director Regan moved adoption of Board Action 4035. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed 7-0 (7-yes, 0-no; with Student Representative Stickler voting yes, unofficial).

Director Sargent moved adoption of the above-numbered items, with the exception of Board Action Numbers 4032 and 4035. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed unanimously (vote: 7-yes, 0-no; with Student Representative Stickler absent).

Resolution to Adopt Immediate Action Program Investments and Building Stabilization Projects and Authorizing Interim Funding

RECITALS

- A. Portland Public School ("District") recently completed a thorough assessment of its facilities in 2008 ("Facilities Assessment"), an evaluation that produced comprehensive data about the condition of each school building. The assessment identified deficiencies in all school facilities, and pointed to both short-term actions and a long-term program of rebuilding and renovation.
- B. The Facilities Assessment found that almost all District facilities, on average more than 20 years older than most comparable school districts, are at or near the end of their useful life. Most major building systems require replacement. Designed and built in a different era, the District's schools do not meet the needs of students and teachers in a 21st century learning environment. The District needs to completely rebuild and modernize its school buildings.
- C. When the Facilities Assessment was presented to the Board of Education ("Board"), the Board responded in several ways:
 - 1. Based on the data, the Board concluded that major school renovations could no longer be postponed.
 - 2. The Board has indicated the need to maintain momentum generated by the current facilities assessment and planning initiative.
 - 3. The Board adopted guidelines, with a set of guiding principles and the adoption of criteria, to lead the District in creating a long-term capital plan.¹
 - 4. The Board has continued to evaluate alternative financing options, including timing of a capital bond measure that would be referred to the voters to support the district's rebuilding and renovation needs, and interim financing to address the most immediate capital needs.²
 - 5. The Board has reviewed the "Short Term Building Stabilization Projects and Program Investment Plan, Including Recommendation for Interim Funding for 2009 and 2010 Construction Seasons," a document presented to the Board at its January 12, 2009, regular board meeting.
- D. The promise of an early 2009 Federal "Economic Stimulus" funding, including federal dollars for school construction projects, is very timely and offers District the opportunity to fund projects in the near-term that would otherwise be delayed until long-term financing could be secured. As part of the continuing work to advance the District's long-term facilities initiative, District staff has developed a capital construction plan that could be implemented quickly to meet the federal goal of providing jobs during the nation's, and our region's, economic downturn. Undertaking construction projects will create jobs for workers in the Portland area.
- E. The Board acknowledges that long-range rebuilding and remodeling needs exceed \$1 billion. Of this amount, \$289 million of high priority short-term facilities work has been identified that would

support programs and help stabilize the District's facilities with a positive impact on almost every school building. These high priority projects would address:

- 1. Overcrowding, capacity for physical education, school libraries, and science classes, and other modifications to support more effective implementation of the educational programs in District school facilities:
- 2. Energy and resource conservation measures;
- 3. Building stabilization projects (such as roof replacements, seismic improvements, security measures and improved accessibility); and,
- 4. Building code compliance measures.

In addition, the essential preparation for effective, efficient and timely implementation of an extensive capital plan (pre-construction work, obtaining professional services, managing and monitoring contracts, etc.) is also included in this short-term program investment and building stabilization plan.

- F. Of the \$289 million of identified program investment and stabilization projects, District staff has identified nearly \$87 million in highest priority work, that is ready for immediate action, *i.e.* which can be implemented within the next three to 18 months.
- G. Funding these highest priority projects could be addressed with local, state, and/or federal economic stimulus or other funding programs as well as interim borrowing, with any interim borrowing repaid from a future capital bond or other funding sources.
- H. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee of the Board has thoroughly reviewed the "Short Term Building Stabilization Projects and Program Investment Plan, Including Recommendation for Interim Funding for 2009 and 2010 Construction Seasons" and the identified immediate action highest priority projects and work efforts, and unanimously recommends this resolution to the Board for approval.

RESOLUTION

- The Board reaffirms its commitment to a long-range capital construction program that will address the educational program and school facilities needs identified in the recently completed Facilities Assessment.
- 2. The Board affirms that the list of immediate action highest priority projects, attached to this resolution and made a part hereof, totaling nearly \$87 million need to be addressed as soon as financing is identified and secured, in order to make specific educational program improvements identified in the plan, to stabilize the deteriorating condition of our schools and keep schools warm, safe and dry, to continue the essential preparatory and capacity-building work to maintain the momentum of this overall initiative, to be ready to make use of any local, state and/or federal economic stimulus or other funding programs, and to prepare for future renovation and rebuilding projects when funding for the long range plan has been secured.
- 3. The Board approves proceeding with the attached highest priority projects with funding provided through any local, state or federal economic stimulus or other public funding programs.
- 4. In addition, the Board directs that this funding be supplemented with a loan of up to \$25.75 million from the District's General Fund to the 21st Century Capital Project Fund, or from other interim borrowing as appropriate. This District funding arrangement will be structured to have no negative impact on General Fund operations, will be reimbursed from short term capital borrowing should that present a more favorable alternative or if the borrowed funds are required

to support District operations through the General Fund, and the borrowed funds will in any case be repaid with proceeds from a future capital borrowing or other funding source. The proceeds from the Construction Excise Tax will be available to support this funding arrangement.

- 5. The Board notes that these immediate work efforts will include the following:
 - a. Roof work, including structural upgrades, comprising first phase roof work for summer 2009 (approximately \$16.35 million).
 - b. Modular classrooms to support education programs through alleviation of overcrowding at certain schools (the attached list may be modified based on further analysis) (approximately \$1.90 million).
 - c. Energy conservation and mechanical project construction documents, updated ADA Plan, and additional evaluations to determine highest priority seismic work (approximately \$0.65 million).
 - d. Architectural and engineering services in preparation for the second phase of roof work in the summer of 2010 (approximately \$0.50 million).
 - e. Pre-construction services contracts, site evaluations, demonstration classrooms, construction documents for two swing spaces, schematic drawings for two schools targeted for replacement or full modernization, and capital program staff (approximately \$6.35 million).
- 6. The Board authorizes the Superintendent or her designee to develop processes to execute and implement this resolution.

RESOLUTION No. 4033

Appointment of Citizen Budget Review Committee Members

RECITALS

- A. The mission of the Citizen Budget Review Committee ("CBRC") is to review, evaluate, and make recommendations to the Board of Education ("Board") for Portland Public Schools ("District") regarding the Superintendent's proposed budget and other budgetary issues identified by the CBRC or by the Board.
- B. In November 2006, the voters of the District passed Measure 26-84, a local option levy, which mandates independent citizen oversight to ensure that tax dollars are used for purposes approved by local voters—teachers, classrooms, learning materials, education programs and curriculum. Measure 26-84 further mandates that no funds will be used for District administration.
- C. On December 10, 2007, by way of Resolution No. 3822, the Board expanded the mission of the CBRC to include performing the independent citizen oversight required by Measure 26-84.
- D. The CBRC receives its charge from the Board. The Finance, Audit, and Operations Committee ("FAO") may assign additional projects to the CBRC

- E. The CBRC is composed of eight to twelve volunteer members. From an applicant pool, the Board appoints members to two-year terms. The CBRC also includes a student member who is appointed to a one-year term.
- F. The Board recognizes that District employees and community members bring specialized knowledge and expertise to the CBRC and to the budgetary review process. The Board instructs all CBRC members to employ discretion, to avoid conflicts of interest and their appearance, and to exercise care in performing their duties and making recommendations from which they may personally benefit.
- G. The District reached out to prospective CBRC applicants by advertising in local publications, including *The Oregonian* and minority publications; by informal outreach methods such as personal contact by Board members and District employees; and by posting notice of the open volunteer positions on the District's web site.
- H. The following five CBRC members continue to serve the second year of a two-year term that expires June 30, 2009:

Minutes

Regular Business Minutes of December 18, 2008

School Board Urges Congressional Passage of Federal Recovery and Reinvestment Act (2009) at Full Funding for (A) Stabilization Grants to Restore State Funding to School Districts and (B) Modernization, Renovation and Repair Funds to Local School Districts

RECITALS

- A. Declining revenues resulting from the economic downturn are putting Portland Public Schools ("District") and other school districts in Oregon and across the nation in an untenable position, forcing us to consider budget reduction options including cutting days from the school year; furloughing or laying off teachers, bus drivers, custodians, and other school personnel; and spending down "rainy day" reserves funds without any confidence that the rainy day will end in the foreseeable future. This would have a negative impact on students, families, and our communities.
- B. The State of Oregon, which provides most of the funds for Oregon public schools, has a limited ability to respond to this situation, because the State cannot deficit spend.
- C. The District has \$88 million in "shovel ready" capital projects that could begin this spring, including \$34 million in roof repairs, \$9.2 million in energy efficiency projects, science lab improvements in 43 schools, \$8.4 million for expanded libraries with new technology, and \$6.3 million to create healthy school buildings. This means nearly 1,400 new living wage jobs for the Portland area.
- D. The United States House of Representatives passed legislation providing for \$79 billion in stabilization funds for state governments, much of which would be used for public schools, and providing for \$14 billion in construction funds for K-12 public school capital projects. Federal funding is estimated to support 46,000 jobs in Oregon alone.
- E. The District's proportionate share of the House bill would not by any means address our entire budget shortfall or our capital needs, but would make a dramatic difference in our ability to respond to the economic crisis and provide a quality public education for our students.
- F. Layoffs and furloughs in the public school systems of Portland, other Oregon districts, and school districts throughout the nation will have a negative impact on the local, state, and national economy, counteracting the positive job-creating effects of any federal economic stimulus legislation. A school district is among the largest employers in cities and towns, and layoffs can dramatically affect local economies. For example, a reduction of \$20 million in state support for education for the District could mean school year layoffs during this fiscal year equaling the equivalent of 220 teachers from the Portland system.
- G. Investments in education are critical to the long-term economic strength of this city, this state, and this nation, and for that matter, any nation. *The New York Times* has reported that when Japan struggled to use economic stimulus measures to pull itself out of its 1990s depression,

"A 1998 report by the Japan Institute for Local Government, a nonprofit policy research group, found that every 1 trillion yen, or about \$11.2 billion, spent on social services like care for the elderly and monthly pension payments added 1.64 trillion yen in growth. Financing for schools and education delivered an even bigger boost of 1.74 trillion yen, the report found."

Japan's lesson was that not enough was spent on social services and education during this period. There has been much discussion in the national media on how the United States can

avoid a long-term economic downturn equivalent to Japan's "lost decade;" we should heed this lesson from Japan.

- H. Federal stimulus dollars will be reimbursed by future taxes paid by employees, including our nation's children and grandchildren. It is in the best interest of the country to ensure that these future taxpayers are given improved educational opportunities in 21st Century School buildings, so that they become high wage earners, able to support the economic decisions being made today.
- I. We are grateful for President Obama's commitment and congressional action that provides dramatic support for public education, particularly new funding for special education, Title I grants for disadvantaged students, federal dollars for technology, and energy tax credits to support our green building commitments for new school construction. But the United States Senate is currently considering a dramatically changed version that would cut the state stabilization funds in half and eliminate all funds for school construction projects.
- I. The decision by certain senators to drastically reduce the funding for schools from the level proposed by the House is unwise economic policy and unwise education policy.
- J. We note that we share common cause with advocates for health care for low-income families, long-term care for low-income seniors, and other social services, and with advocates for public safety programs. If the federal government does not provide a reasonable level of assistance to schools, it will put additional pressure on the State General Fund, which the Legislature must allocate among education, health care, senior services and public safety.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board of Education calls on Senators Wyden and Merkley to use their influence to restore assistance to education to the levels proposed by in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act 2009 passed by the House of Representatives.
- We call on Oregon's Representatives Earl Blumenauer, David Wu, Kurt Schrader, and Peter DeFazio, to urge their leaders and colleagues to stand firm on the House version of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, providing full stabilization funding to the states, and significant capital funding to local school districts to begin construction projects immediately to help the ailing economy. And we call on Representative Greg Walden, along with the rest of our Congressional delegation, to support a reasonable conference committee outcome to get federal resources to the states, and to students, as soon as possible.
- 3. We ask our colleagues in school districts throughout the state and the nation to join us in this plea to members of Congress and to President Obama.

During the Committee of the Whole, Director Adkins moved adoption of Board Action 4039. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed by a vote of 5-2 (5-yes, 2-no; Directors Henning and Gonzalez voting no and Student Representative Stickler voting yes, unofficial).

During the Committee of the Whole, Director Regan moved adoption of Board Action 4040. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed unanimously (7-yes, 0-no; with Student Representative Stickler voting yes, unofficial).

Director Sargent moved adoption of the above-numbered items, with the exception of Board Actions 4039 and 4040. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed unanimously (vote: 7-yes, 0-no; with Student Representative Stickler absent).

Resolution Supporting Agreement with Nurture 247 Limited Partnership to Lease School Space in Mixed Use Facility

RECITALS

- A. Portland Public Schools ("District") has struggled with declining enrollment for many years.
- B. With the redevelopment of the center of the city over the last 10-15 years, many new residents have moved into Portland's core. Because the mix of units has been primarily studios or 1-2 bedroom apartments the residential options have not attracted families even though 30% of the housing is affordable housing. The chance to hold on to the young families already in the core and to be able to influence the attraction of more families is a great opportunity.
- C. Initial conversations with parents have demonstrated support for the District to commence a school in the Pearl District portion of NW Portland, where there is not currently an option for families living in urban core.
- D. To answer this growing need, the District is proposing a five-year lease on a 14,000 square foot space to create a primary school in the city's core. An experienced developer of affordable housing in Portland has approached the District about partnering to place a primary school in his 139-unit building at NW 13th Avenue x NW Raleigh Street.
- E. The District has an opportunity to lease this 14,000-foot space on the ground floor of a new mixed-use building which could become several grades of a primary school. The actual school design would be created as part of the District's Program Approval Process. The site also offers potential expansion space for the introduction of childcare and after school care.
- F. The near-term goal is to encourage residential developers to build larger family style units as they see the demand and for the District to propose a partnership with a local developer to construct a full elementary or K-8 school in one of the new high density housing developments, thus creating a full-service urban school.
- G. The Student Support and Community Relations Committee reviewed this issue on January 14, 2009. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee reviewed this Resolution on February 9, 2009 and recommended adoption by the Board of Education ("Board").

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board supports the District's entering into an agreement to lease building space from the Nurture 247 Limited Partnership in an amount not to exceed \$290,000 per year, with the program targeted to commence in the 2011-12 school year for a period of five years.
- 2. The Office of Schools will follow the school open/closure policy to set up a school. The Program Proposal Form will also be used to explore the breadth of the program for this project.
- 3. The Board requests a report on the current and projected enrollment and success of the school at the June 2011 and June 2012 meetings of the Student Support and Community Relations Committee.

Resolution to End 8th Grade Academy at Madison High School

RECITALS

- A. On February 25, 2008, by way of Resolution No. 3853, the Board of Education ("Board") for Portland Public Schools ("District") approved the creation of an 8th grade Academy at Madison High School.
- B. At that time, the Superintendent and Board recommended the District temporarily establish an academy at Madison High School for eighth grade students. This proposal was perceived to cause the least disruption to the students, schools, and families impacted, while the District sought a permanent solution to allow both Rigler and Scott Schools to complete the transition to K-8 schools.
- C. Rigler and Scott have now requested their 8th grade students remain at Rigler and Scott for the 2009-10 school year and thereafter, thus allowing both schools to become complete K-8 schools. Over the coming months, the District will address facility issues at both schools to ensure adequate space for the students.
- D. The Board thanks Madison High School for its efforts during this transition and for making students feel welcomed in the high school environment. The Board also thanks the Rigler and Scott students, staff, and families for their support during the 2008-09 school year.
- E. The Student Support and Community Relations Committee reviewed this issue on February 11, 2009, and voted 2-0 (Director Regan absent) to support the Superintendent's recommendation for adoption by the Board.

RESOLUTION

The Board supports the Superintendent's recommendation to end the 8th grade Academy at Madison High School and to have the 8th grade students remain at Rigler K-8 and Scott K-8 Schools commencing with the 2009-10 school year and continuing thereafter.

RESOLUTION No. 4041

Amendment No. 2 to the FY 2008-09 Budget for School District No. 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon

RECITALS

- A. On June 23, 2008, by way of Resolution No. 3932, the Portland Public Schools ("District") Board of Education ("Board") adopted the FY 2008-09 budget.
- B. Oregon Local Budget Law, ORS 294.480, allows budget changes after adoption under prescribed guidelines
- C. On December 15, 2008, by way of Resolution No. 4008, the Board amended the FY 2008-09 budget.
- D. Resolution No. 4008 (Amendment No. 1) increased the Beginning Balance for FY 2008-09, reduced the State School Fund allocation for FY 2008-09 and increased the allocation for Support Services, Facility Acquisition and Construction, and Contingency.

- E. This Amendment No. 2 would further revise the FY 2008-09 Adopted Budget under ORS 294.480 guidelines, which state the budget may be amended at a regular meeting of the governing body.
- F. Amendment No. 2 reclassifies \$1,137,406 from Support Services to Instruction. This adjustment results from the Fall 2008 process that realigns expenditures to match actual school staffing assignments and other related adjustments.
- G. Amendment No. 2 includes an appropriation that transfers \$25,750,000 from the General Fund to the 21st Century Capital Project Fund in the form of a Capital Loan for purposes outlined in Resolution No. 4032 adopted by the Board on February 9, 2009.
- H. As required by Oregon Local Budget Law, Attachment A is prepared on the budgetary basis of accounting, which shows the General Fund Contingency being reduced by the \$25,750,000 transfer, to \$12.1 million. Annual financial statements prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and published in the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report will reflect the Capital Loan and corresponding total reserve balance in the Statement of Net Assets.
- I. Availability of General Fund reserves will not be limited by this action. If the General Fund requires access to the reserves for operating purposes, it is the Board's intention to authorize immediate repayment to the General Fund. The repayment may occur through transferring back to the General Fund any unspent and unencumbered funds in Fund 405, or through proceeds from external borrowing, or through some combination of both.
- J. The Finance, Audit and Operations committee ("FAO") reviewed and discussed the recommended budget adjustments including an interfund loan to the newly established 21st Century Capital Project Fund.
- K. The FAO voted unanimously to recommend the full Board approve these budget amendments.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board hereby amends budgeted resources and expenditure appropriation levels as summarized by appropriation level in Attachment A for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2008.
- 2. The Board further directs that if the General Fund requires access to the funds transferred to the 21st Century Capital Project Fund for operating purposes, it is the Board's intent to authorize immediate repayment to the General Fund. The repayment may occur through transferring back to the General Fund any unspent and unencumbered funds in Fund 405, or through proceeds from external borrowing, or through some combination of both.

RESOLUTION No. 4042

Establish a New Fund, Fund 405, the 21st Century Capital Project Fund

RECITALS

- A. On December 10, 2007, by way of Resolution No. 3821, the Portland Public Schools ("District") Board of Education ("Board") adopted an Interim Long-Range Facilities Plan ("Plan").
- B. The Plan includes forecasted expenditures for capital construction, major (capital) renovation, and information technology projects.
- C. On July 21, 2008, by way of Resolution No. 3938, the Board authorized short-term borrowing approaches to finance capital construction and major renovation projects that can be reimbursed from general obligation bonds the District expects to submit to its voters in the future.
- D. On January 27, 2009, the Finance, Audit and Operations committee ("FAO") recommended that the full Board authorize proceeding with interim financing to fund an initial set of identified capital projects.
- E. On February 9, 2009, by way of Resolution No. 4032, the Board authorized proceeding with interim financing to fund an initial set of identified capital projects.
- F. It is the intent of the District to use a mix of resources to fund the expenditures. The resources may include debt proceeds from the issuance of general obligation bonds and/or Certificates of Participation ("COPs") proceeds, funds from the Construction Excise Tax, transfers or interfund loans from other District funds or discretionary general fund resources.
- G. If District voters approve a general obligation bond for the 21st Century Schools the COPs, the interfund loans or other previously issued debt instruments may be repaid from the debt proceeds of a general obligation bond.
- H. A capital projects fund is required to record all resources and expenditures used to finance acquisition or construction of major capital facilities.
- I. On February 10, 2009, the FAO voted unanimously to recommend that the Board approve a new fund dependent on Tax Supervising & Conservation Commission ("TSCC") review and approval.
- J. Establishment of a new fund during the fiscal year requires a public hearing be held by the TSCC prior to Board action on the resolution to establish the new fund.

- K. On February 17, 2009, the TSCC held a public hearing on the proposed fund and approved the establishment of the capital fund.
- L. School districts should maintain only those funds that are required to meet legal and operating requirements.
- M. A Debt Service fund may be required to manage the repayment of debt should such debt be issued by the District. The District will establish the required debt service funds when necessary.
- N. It is the intention of the Board to authorize necessary budget adjustments within a separate resolution that will also authorize an interfund loan.

RESOLUTION

The Board hereby establishes Fund 405, the 21st Century Capital Project Fund, to manage effectively resources and requirements for facilities acquisition and construction.

<u>Authorize an Interfund Loan in the Amount of \$25,750,000</u> from the General Fund to the 21st Century Capital Project Fund

RECITALS

- A. On December 10, 2007, by way of Resolution No. 3821, the Portland Public Schools ("District") Board of Education ("Board") adopted an Interim Long-Range Facilities Plan ("Plan").
- B. The Plan includes forecasted expenditures for capital construction, major (capital) renovation, and information technology projects.
- C. On July 21, 2008, by way of Resolution No. 3938, the Board authorized short-term borrowing approaches to finance capital construction and major renovation projects that can be reimbursed from general obligation bonds the District expects to submit to its voters in the future.
- D. On February 9, 2009, by way of Resolution No. 4032, the Board authorized proceeding with an initial set of identified capital projects to be funded using an interim financing approach.
- E, It is the intent of the District to use a mix of resources to fund the expenditures. The resources may include debt proceeds from the issuance of general obligation bonds and/or Certificates of Participation ("COPs") proceeds, funds from the Construction Excise Tax, transfers or interfund loans from other District funds or discretionary general fund resources.
- F. If District voters approve a general obligation bond for the 21st Century Schools the COPs, then interfund loans or other previously issued debt instruments may be repaid from the debt proceeds of a general obligation bond.
- G. The Board intends to finance the costs of the initial projects through an Interfund Loan ("Capital Loan") from the General Fund (101) to the 21st Century Capital Project Fund (405).
- H. Availability of General Fund reserves will not be limited by this action. If the General Fund requires access to the reserves for operating purposes, it is the Board's intent to authorize immediate repayment to the General Fund. The repayment may occur through transferring back to the General Fund any unspent and unencumbered funds in Fund 405 or, through proceeds from external borrowing or, through some combination of both.

- I. Capital Loans are authorized under Oregon Local Budget Law, ORS 294.460.
- J. The Capital Loan shall incur interest at a variable rate, defined as the monthly rate set by the Local Government Investment Pool ("LGIP"), thus ensuring no negative impact to General Fund interest income.
- K. Capital Loans for capital expenditures shall provide for the repayment in full of the loan over a term not to exceed five years.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board hereby authorizes an interfund Capital Loan for the purpose of funding capital project expenditures identified in Resolution No. 4032 dated February 9, 2009.
- 2. The Board hereby amends budgeted resources and expenditure appropriation levels as summarized by appropriation level in Attachment A for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2008.
- 3. The Board directs that the Capital Loan will be from the General Fund (101) to the 21st Century Capital Project Fund (405) in the principal amount of \$25,750,000.
- 4. The Board further directs the Capital Loan shall incur interest at the variable rate of return set by the LGIP on a monthly basis.
- 5. The Board further directs that it is the intent of the Board to repay the Capital Loan in full no later than February 28, 2011.
- 6. The Board further directs that if the General Fund requires access to the reserves for operating purposes, it is the Board's intent to authorize immediate repayment to the General Fund. The repayment may occur through transferring back to the General Fund any unspent and unencumbered funds in Fund 405 or through proceeds from external borrowing or, through some combination of both.

Resolution Approving Renewal of the Charter Agreement with Portland Village Public Charter School

RECITALS

- A. On June 6, 2006, School District No. 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon ("District") entered into a contract with Portland Village Public Charter School, an Oregon nonprofit corporation, for the operation of Portland Village Public Charter School ("Portland Village").
- B. The initial contract term is for three years. It terminates June 30, 2009.
- C. The process and criteria for considering the renewal of a charter are described in ORS 338.065. The criteria include a requirement that the first renewal of a charter must be for the same term as the initial charter.
- D. Portland Village delivered its request for renewal of its charter agreement as prescribed by ORS 338.065.
- E. The District Charter School Manager conducted a good faith review of Portland Village's renewal request using criteria consistent with ORS 338.065(6), which require an evaluation of whether the public charter school
 - 1. Is in compliance with ORS Chapter 338 and all other applicable state and federal laws;
 - 2. Is in compliance with the charter of the public charter school;
 - Is meeting or is working toward meeting the student performance goals and agreements specified in the charter or in any other written agreements between the District and Portland Village;
 - 4. Is fiscally stable; and
 - 5. Is in compliance with any other renewal criteria specified in the charter.
- F. On February 9, 2009, the Board of Education's Subcommittee on Charters ("Subcommittee") met to consider the Charter School Manager's report and to prepare for the public hearing required by the charter renewal process. A copy of the Charter School Manager's report is on file at the District office.
- G. On February 12, 2009, the Subcommittee held the required public hearing on Portland Village's charter renewal request. A video recording and a copy of the hearing minutes and materials are on file at the District office.
- H. On March 12, 2009, after reviewing the information presented by Portland Village in support of its renewal request, the staff review of the request, and information from the public hearing, Superintendent Smith concurred with the staff report and recommended that the District negotiate a new charter agreement with Portland Village for a term of three years consistent with ORS Chapter 338 and with District policies. A copy of the Superintendent's recommendation is on file at the District office.
- I. On March 12, 2009, the subcommittee met to deliberate on, and to craft, its recommendation to the full Board of Education ("Board"). After careful consideration of the information presented at the public hearing and of the Superintendent's recommendation, the subcommittee voted 3-0 to recommend that the Board renew the District's charter agreement with Portland Village and direct

District staff to negotiate a new charter agreement with Portland Village for a term of three years consistent with ORS Chapter 338 and with District policies.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board has determined that Portland Village's request to renew its charter meets the criteria of ORS Chapter 338.
- 2. The Board directs District staff to negotiate a three-year charter contract between the District and Portland Village that is consistent with ORS Chapter 338 and with District policies, is in a form approved by the District's General Counsel, and that includes the following conditions:
 - a. The District and Portland Village will cooperate in developing performance measures and benchmarks for student achievement that will be used to continuously measure Portland Village's students' progress toward state, District, and school standards; and that will inform Portland Village's school improvement and accountability planning.
 - b. Portland Village will provide evidence satisfactory to the District that
 - i. Sources of donations and grants are reasonably assured, and that there is a plan in place for supplementing funds received from the State School Fund ("SSF");
 - ii. Portland Village has a contingency plan in place if revenues are significantly less than or expenses are significantly more than projected, or if there is a significant reduction in the SSF charter school rate: and that
 - iii. Portland Village will amend and resubmit each school year's budget to the District when there are any significant changes to the SSF charter school rate.
 - c. Portland Village will provide evidence satisfactory to the District of its detailed plan to improve its students' writing scores.
 - d. An enrollment cap will be determined during the contract negotiations and will be incorporated into the contract for the renewal period.
 - e. Portland Village will provide a plan for how it intends to meet specific legislative intents regarding the dissemination of different, innovative, and proven methods for instruction and assessment, which will be a requirement of its annual accountability plan and report.
 - f. Prior to entering into a renewal charter contract, Portland Village will provide:
 - As a requirement of the annual accountability plan, a detailed marketing plan for increasing racial and socio-economic diversity in both the student population and the charter school's board, including annual goals and a system of measuring annual progress toward these goals;
 - ii. A transportation plan;
 - iii. Evidence satisfactory to the District of its curriculum plan for middle school (grades 6–8). Progress and growth reports for these grades will be incorporated into Portland Village's annual accountability plan and report;
 - iv. Evidence satisfactory to the District of an explicit non-discrimination statement on its website and on its enrollment application; and

- v. Evidence that the word "charter" appears in all documents, letterhead, websites, marketing materials, and other publications.
- 3. The Board directs the Superintendent to report to the Board each year (via the appropriate committee) on Portland Village's compliance with the terms of the charter agreement. This report may be part of an overall report for all District-sponsored charter schools and should be submitted by May 1 of each year.

RESOLUTION No. 4064

Resolution Approving Renewal of the Charter Agreement with The Emerson Public Charter School

RECITALS

- A. In September 2003, School District No. 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon ("District") entered into a contract with The Emerson Charter School, an Oregon nonprofit corporation, for the operation of The Emerson Charter School ("Emerson").
- B. The initial contract term was for three years.
- C. On October 24, 2006, the District entered into a three-year renewal contract with Emerson. The contract terminates June 30, 2009.
- D. The process and criteria for considering the renewal of a charter are described in ORS 338.065. The criteria include a requirement that the first renewal of a charter must be for the same term as the initial charter. Each charter agreement after the first renewal must be for at least five years but for no more than 10 years.
- E. Emerson delivered its request for renewal of its charter agreement as prescribed by ORS 338.065.
- F. The District Charter School Manager conducted a good faith review of Emerson's renewal request using criteria consistent with ORS 338.065(6), which require an evaluation of whether the public charter school
 - 1. Is in compliance with ORS Chapter 338 and all other applicable state and federal laws;
 - 2. Is in compliance with the charter of the public charter school;
 - Is meeting or is working toward meeting the student performance goals and agreements specified in the charter or in any other written agreements between the District and Emerson;
 - 4. Is fiscally stable; and
 - 5. Is in compliance with any other renewal criteria specified in the charter.
- F. On February 9, 2009, the Board of Education's Sub-Committee on Charters ("Subcommittee") met to consider the Charter School Manager's report and to prepare for the public hearing required by the charter renewal process. A copy of the Charter School Manager's report is on file at the District office.

- G. On February 13, 2009, the Sub-Committee held the required public hearing on Emerson's charter renewal request. A video recording and a copy of the hearing minutes and materials are on file at the District office.
- H. On March 12, 2009, after reviewing the information presented by Emerson in support of its renewal request, the staff review of the request, and information from the public hearing, Superintendent Smith concurred with the staff report and recommended that the District negotiate a new charter agreement with Emerson for a flexible term of five years consistent with ORS Chapter 338 and with District policies. A copy of the Superintendent's recommendation is on file at the District office.
- I. On March 12, 2009, the Sub-Committee met to deliberate on, and to craft, its recommendation to the full Board of Education ("Board"). After careful consideration of the information presented at the public hearing and of the Superintendent's recommendation, the Sub-Committee voted 3-0 to recommend that the Board renew the District's charter agreement with Emerson and direct District staff to negotiate a new charter agreement with Emerson for a flexible term of five years consistent with ORS Chapter 338 and with District policies.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board has determined that Emerson's request to renew its charter meets the criteria of ORS Chapter 338.
- 2. The Board directs staff to negotiate a five-year flexible charter contract between the District and Emerson that is consistent with ORS Chapter 338 and with District policies, is in a form approved by the District's General Counsel, and that includes the following conditions:
 - a. The District and Emerson will cooperate in developing performance measures and benchmarks for student achievement that will be used to continuously measure Emerson's students' progress toward state, District, and school standards; and that will inform Emerson's school improvement and accountability planning.
 - b. Emerson will provide evidence satisfactory to the District that
 - Sources of donations and grants are reasonably assured, and that there is a plan in place for supplementing funds received from the State School Fund ("SSF"):
 - ii. Emerson has a contingency plan in place if revenues are significantly less than or expenses are significantly more than projected, or if there is a significant reduction in the SSF charter school rate; and that
 - iii. Emerson will amend and resubmit each school year's budget to the District when there are any significant changes to the SSF charter school rate.
 - c. Emerson will provide evidence satisfactory to the District of its detailed plan to improve its students' writing scores.
 - d. An enrollment cap will be determined during contract negotiations and will be incorporated into the contract for the renewal period.
 - e. Emerson will provide a plan for how it intends to meet specific legislative intents regarding the dissemination of different, innovative, and proven methods for instruction and assessment, which will be a requirement of its annual accountability plan and report.
 - f. Prior to entering into a renewal charter contract and as a requirement of the annual accountability plan, Emerson will provide a detailed marketing plan for increasing racial

and socio-economic diversity in both the student population and the charter school's board, including annual goals and a system of measuring annual progress toward these goals.

3. The Board directs the Superintendent to report to the Board each year (via the appropriate committee) on Emerson's compliance with the terms of the charter agreement. This report may be part of an overall report for all District-sponsored charter schools and should be submitted by May 1 of each year.

RESOLUTION No. 4065

Resolution Denying Renewal of the Charter Agreement with Leadership and Entrepreneurship Public Charter High School

RECITALS

- A. On August 1, 2006, School District No. 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon ("District") entered into a contract with KOREducators for the operation of Leadership and Entrepreneurship Public Charter High School ("LEP").
- B. The initial contract term is for three years. It terminates June 30, 2009.
- C. The process and criteria for considering the renewal of a charter are described in ORS 338.065. The criteria include a requirement that the first renewal of a charter must be for the same term as the initial charter.
- D. LEP delivered its request for renewal of its charter agreement as prescribed by ORS 338.065.
- E. The District Charter School Manager conducted a good faith review of LEP's renewal request using criteria consistent with ORS 338.065(6), which require an evaluation of whether the public charter school
 - a. Is in compliance with ORS Chapter 338 and all other applicable state and federal laws;
 - b. Is in compliance with the charter of the public charter school;
 - c. Is meeting or is working to meet toward meeting the student performance goals and agreements specified in the charter or in any other written agreements between the District and LEP:
 - d. Is fiscally stable; and
 - e. Is in compliance with any other renewal criteria specified in the charter.
- F. On February 9, 2009, the Board of Education's subcommittee on Charters ("Subcommittee") met to consider the Charter School Manager's report and to prepare for the public hearing required by the charter renewal process. A copy of the Charter School Manager's report is on file at the District office.
- G. On February 13, 2009, the subcommittee held the required public hearing on LEP's charter renewal request. A video recording and a copy of the hearing minutes and materials are on file at the District office.

- H. On March 12, 2009, after reviewing the information presented by LEP in support of its renewal request, the staff review of the request, information from the public hearing, and based on information regarding LEP's fiscal stability, Superintendent Smith recommended that the District not renew the charter agreement with LEP after it expires. A copy of the Superintendent's recommendation is on file at the District office.
- I. On March 12, 2009, the Sub-Committee met to deliberate its recommendation to the full Board of Education ("Board"). After careful consideration of the information provided in support of LEP's renewal request and of the staff's and Superintendent's respective recommendations of non-renewal, the subcommittee voted 3-0 to recommend that the Boards deny LEP's request to renew the District's charter agreement with LEP and should not negotiate a new charter agreement with LEP. The subcommittee based its determination on its findings that LEP did not present evidence satisfactory to the District that the school is fiscally stable, including the following:
 - a. LEP has failed to report or pay into its employees' PERS accounts since July 2008, despite apparently withholding 6% employee PERS contributions from its employees' monthly paychecks.
 - b. LEP's expenses exceeded its revenue in 2007-08, resulting in a deficit balance at June 30, 2008.
 - c. LEP has a long-term debt for tenant improvements.
 - d. LEP has a management fee due to its landlord in June 2009, and the lease payment is scheduled to increase next year unless otherwise negotiated.
 - e. LEP appears to have outstanding, unpaid bills.
 - f. Despite the 10% reduction in salaries that LEP staff accepted in January 2009 and the fact that the District agreed to accelerate LEP's State School Fund ("SSF") payments for the remainder of the 2008-09 school year, expenses still do not align with revenues.
 - g. LEP-provided financial information has been intermittent and at times unreliable.
- The Subcommittee urged LEP to appeal this decision to the District if it can provide evidence that
 it has remedied its financial situation and can demonstrate fiscal stability and sustainability going
 forward.

RESOLUTION

- The Board recognizes the educational opportunities and other services that LEP has provided to its students during the term of the initial charter and commends the fact that it has served an economically and racially diverse population of students, including students who have not succeeded in traditional settings. The Board also recognizes that the program provided by LEP has strong student, parental, and community support, and has been an innovative model for education.
- 2. The Board acknowledges that the District has provided LEP with documentation detailing conditions for renewal of its charter agreement and that copies of the Charter School Manager's report and recommendation, the Superintendent's recommendation, and all Subcommittee materials are on file at the District office. The Board also acknowledges that District staff in several departments have worked in partnership with LEP for several months to help remedy LEP's financial crisis and that LEP's renewal request has been evaluated in good faith consistent with ORS 338.065(6).

- 3. After review of the information provided in support of LEP's charter renewal request, including the information from the staff report, the public hearing, the Superintendent's recommendation, and the subcommittee's materials, the Board finds that LEP's charter renewal request does not meet the criteria of ORS 338.065(6) because LEP has not presented evidence satisfactory to the District that the school is fiscally stable.
- 4. As a result of that finding, the Board denies KOREducators' request for the renewal of the charter agreement.
- 5. OAR 581-020-0359(8) states that "[i]f the sponsor does not renew the charter, the public charter school governing body may address the reasons for nonrenewal and resubmit its request to the sponsor within 30 days after the date on which the sponsor notified the public charter school governing body of the decision not to renew the charter. If a sponsor receives a revised request under this section, the sponsor shall review the request using the process required by sections (2) to (7) of this rule. A public charter school governing board may only submit a revised request once under this section unless otherwise specified by the sponsor." The Board encourages LEP to engage in the appeals process for renewal with the District if LEP is able to provide sufficient evidence satisfactory to the District that
 - a. Necessary and sufficient financial management systems are in place;
 - b. The school is fiscally stable and has a reasonable, long-term plan for maintaining fiscal and operational stability;
 - c. Sources of donations and grants are reasonably assured, and that there is a plan in place for supplementing funds received from the SSF:
 - d. LEP has become fully compliant with PERS requirements, in accordance with ORS 338.135(5);
 - e. LEP has a contingency plan in place if revenues are significantly less than or expenses are significantly more than projected, or if there is a significant cut in the SSF; and that
 - f. LEP will amend and resubmit each school year's budget to the District when there are any significant changes to the SSF charter school rates.
- 6. If LEP does not appeal the Board's decision or is not able to successfully demonstrate through the appeals process that it has remedied its financial situation and has a long-term, sustainable financial plan going forward, the Board directs District staff to support individual students and families through their transition from LEP. The District stands ready to work cooperatively with LEP to identify the appropriate alternative within the current system of high schools and education options that best meets each student's needs.

RESOLUTION No. 4066

New Construction Project: Roofing/Solar Projects
Authorization for Alternative Procurement Process

RECITALS

A. The 2007 Reshape School public summit resulted in five guiding principles for Portland Public Schools ("District") to use in future decision-making as regards school buildings.

- B. On October 16, 2008, by way of Resolution No. 3987, the Board of Education ("Board") adopted the Five Guiding Principles resulting from the 2007 Reshape School public summit.
- C. The third guiding principle states, "We must invest in sustainable facilities."
- D. For the last decade the District has implemented and completed numerous environmental initiatives, including six Solar 4 R Schools projects, 30 stormwater management projects, 76 fluorescent lighting retrofits, over 40 boiler upgrades, as well as construction of LEED Gold-certified Rosa Parks Elementary School.
- F. District environmental projects currently underway include resource conservation performance contracting at four schools and re-designing the daVinci School high performance classroom to be a net zero energy consumption learning center.
- G. Over the past 12 months, the District has devoted significant staff time to the potential of solar projects on District school campuses, the economics of which are tied to the availability of investors who can take advantage of tax credit financing.
- H. Solar-related work efforts were suspended when the opportunity to obtain tax credit financing appeared to be almost non-existent because of adverse financial market conditions.
- On February 20, 2009, Gerding Edlen Sustainable Solutions LLC ("GESS") approached District with a proposal to add solar electrical systems (paid for by a third party investor) to the District's proposed 2009 roof construction projects.
- J. The Board is designated as the Local Public Contract Review Board under ORS 279A.060.
- K. ORS 279C.335(2) authorizes the Board to exempt certain public contracts or classes of contracts from the competitive bidding process otherwise required by the District's Public Contracting and Purchasing Rules upon certain findings.
- L. The District intends to complete nine roof construction projects during Summer 2009, with a current budget of \$11,357,800. The schools requiring new roofs and related seismic work are identified on Attachment A.
- M. There are significant financial advantages to the District: GESS proposes to provide the required roof and related seismic construction services within the current roofing budget and to include photovoltaic solar electrical systems valued at \$6,125,855 (collectively, "Project") at no additional cost to the District.
- N. There is an additional financial benefit to the District: For approximately six years after the solar electrical system is placed in service on District property in accordance with a roof-top license, a third-party investor will own the system. Once the third-party investor achieves its desired return on investment, the District will take ownership of the system leading directly to long-term energy cost savings, net of required maintenance. These cost savings are currently estimated at \$1,098,647 over the 15-year period following transfer of ownership to the District.
- O. To avoid disruption to the school year, hazard to students, and potential deterioration to District facilities, the Project must be started on or before June 15, 2009, and completed no later than August 28, 2009. Given this time line, there is not enough time in the schedule to incorporate a solar component into a standard competitive procurement process.
- P. Significant operating advantages inure to the District through an alternative procurement process. Because GESS proposes using a negotiated construction manager/general contractor ("CM/GC") alternative form of agreement for construction and separate energy services/roof license agreements with an investor limited liability company ("LLC") in which GESS will be contracted by

- the third party investor to manage the LLC for the solar electrical system, coordinated and efficient construction of the Project is ensured.
- Q. Other operating benefits to the District include benefiting from GESS's particular skills, experience, and expertise developing this unique public Project and leveraging their 13 years of green building and project management expertise that includes 40 LEED registered or certified projects to date, more than any other developer in the United States.
- R. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee reviewed this resolution on March 17, 2009, and recommended its adoption by the Board.

RESOLUTION

- The Board hereby exempts the contracts as described in these recitals and Attachment A from
 the competitive bidding requirements of ORS Chapter 279C and the District's Public Contracting
 and Purchasing Rules. The Board directs that the contracts be awarded by direct negotiation
 with GESS, using a CM/GC form of agreement and with a solar investor LLC managed by GESS,
 as noted above.
- 2. Pursuant to ORS 279C.335(2), this exemption is based on the following findings:
 - The Board finds that this contract exemption is unlikely to encourage favoritism in the a. award of public contracts because the proposal from GESS provides a unique opportunity to complete required roofing/seismic projects in Summer 2009. At the same time and for no additional cost, the District will obtain the long-term environmental and energy benefits that result from the installation of a solar electrical system. The Board finds that direct negotiation with GESS will not encourage favoritism or diminish competition because GESS has particular expertise in delivering similar projects. The Board requires an experienced contractor to ensure that this unique public-private Project can be completed expeditiously during the summer and before the start of the new school year. Finally, the Board finds that the exemption will not encourage favoritism or diminish competition because the Board specifically grants the exemption contingent upon a requirement that all subcontracted construction work under the CM/GC contract, including work that GESS desires to perform with its own forces, will be competitively procured either through a price-based invitation to bid or a qualifications-based request for proposals () competitive process.
 - b. The Board finds that authorizing this contract exemption will result in substantial cost savings to the District. As a result of economies of scale and the introduction of private financing, the District will receive substantial cost savings if both the roofing and solar aspects of the Project are provided by GESS and are constructed at the same time in a coordinated manner. GESS has promised to deliver the Project at or below the budget set forth in Attachment A, while delivering the solar electrical systems at no additional cost to the District. In addition to this immediate cost savings, the District will eventually own the solar electrical systems, providing long-term cost savings over the next 20 years. The Board further finds that selecting a qualified contractor for this specialized work will save District funds by avoiding further costs and delays that could be caused by a contractor with insufficient experience. The Board further finds that taking the time to put together the necessary solicitation documents for such a unique Project and conduct the process would jeopardize completion of the roofing projects this summer to the detriment of the buildings and the students and staff who occupy them. Finally, getting such an innovative Project under contract as quickly as possible could increase its eligibility and/or opportunity for funding under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 Federal "Oregon Way" stimulus program for additional solar installations, roofing, and other energy or water efficiency upgrades for District buildings, resulting in additional cost savings or recoupment.

- c. The Board finds that the current turmoil in the financial markets may have some effect on the ability to provide the solar electrical systems through private investment. At this point, the expectation is that such private investment can be secured, but if private investment cannot be secured, the Board finds that the remaining portions of the project should go forward under the CM/GC contract with GESS so that the roofing projects can be completed in Summer 2009. Otherwise, costs are likely to increase and schools could be damaged by going through another winter without roof repair. Competition will still occur through the competitive solicitation of subcontractors as required above.
- 3. Pursuant to ORS 279C.330, the Board considered the following factors in making the above findings:
 - a. Operational, Budget, and Financial Data: Because the work will be conducted during the summer break, the Board requires a contractor who can expeditiously and safely complete the work. An experienced contractor will minimize school disruption and reduce outside commissioning and oversight costs. The contract price will be equal to or less than the District's budget for the Project and increase the potential for stimulus funding. Finally, the Project will reduce the District's long-term energy costs. Installation of the solar electrical systems at the same time as the roofs are reconstructed will maximize construction efficiency and avoid conflicts between the useful life of the roofs and of the solar electrical systems.
 - b. <u>Public Benefits</u>: The public benefits include the cost savings noted above. Expeditious completion of the Project will ensure that buildings can be occupied by the start of the 2009-10 school year. In addition, the provision of part of the District's electricity needs through renewable solar energy reduces potential greenhouse gas emissions and helps reduce dependence on fossil fuels from abroad.
 - c. <u>Value Engineering</u>: This process will enable the contractor to work with the District to minimize project costs. The CM/GC process enables the District to incorporate any proposed cost savings.
 - d. <u>Specialized Expertise Required</u>: As previously noted, this Project is unique and requires a contractor with the skills and expertise of GESS. This Project is a demonstration of innovative green building technologies, which could be replicated elsewhere within the District or at other public school districts.
 - e. <u>Public Safety</u>: Selection of a contractor with experience will ensure the highest level of student and public safety. Ensuring that the Project is completed during Summer 2009 when school is not in session will avoid the potential safety and security problems that could occur if construction is conducted when students are present.
 - f. <u>Market Conditions</u>: Existing market conditions should result in a very competitive price for the work, and the potential availability of stimulus funding makes proceeding under an alternative procurement process even more attractive.
 - g. <u>Technical Complexity</u>: The incorporation of solar electrical energy as part of roofing and seismic upgrades is on the cutting edge of new green building technology. Selecting a contractor that is familiar with such projects is not only critical to the success of the Project, but also reassuring to parents, faculty, administrators, and students.
 - h. <u>Funding Sources</u>: The District will fund this Project through its proposed 21st Century Capital Projects Fund budget, potentially supplemented with stimulus funding.

- 4. The Board concludes that an exemption from competitive bidding is justified pursuant to the Public Contracting Code found in ORS 279C.335.
- 5. The Board authorizes District staff to negotiate a non-binding memorandum of understanding with GESS containing the above-proposed deal points pending negotiation of the required CM/GC contract and roof license and energy services contracts with GESS and/or the investor subject to review and approval by the District's General Counsel. The construction portions of the contracts require competitive solicitation of subcontractors. The contracts must comply with District Contracting and Purchasing Policies, risk management, and contract requirements, including compliance with the District's minority, women, and emerging small business requirements.
- 6. The Board further authorizes the Deputy Clerk to enter into and execute this non-binding memorandum of understanding with GESS.
- 7. If, the solar portion of the Project cannot be implemented, the Board authorizes the Deputy Clerk to enter into and execute a CM/GC agreement with GESS in order to complete the roofing/seismic projects in Summer 2009.

Adoption of 2009-10 District Performance Audit Plan

- B. The goals of the District Performance Auditor ("Auditor") are
 - 1. To improve program effectiveness and efficiency;
 - 2. To provide useful, objective, and timely information; and
 - 3. To strengthen administrative and management systems and controls.
- C. As directed by Board Policy 1.60.040, at the beginning of each calendar year, the Auditor shall submit an annual audit plan to the Audit Committee for review and comment. The Audit Committee is composed of Board members and members of the public who have expertise in auditing or management. The plan shall include the schools, offices, activities, functions, and programs proposed for audit during the year. The Audit Committee will recommend an annual audit plan to the full Board for approval. This plan may be amended during the year after review with the Audit Committee.
- D. In consultation with the Audit Committee, the Auditor will select topics based on potential for cost savings and service improvements; level of public and school board interest; evidence of problems or wrongdoing; risk of loss or abuse; and availability of audit staff.
- E. On March 18, 2009, the Audit Committee received an overview from the Auditor of his proposed audit plan for 2009-10. The Audit Committee recommends that the Board adopt the plan.

RESOLUTION

The Board approves the following Performance Audit Plan for 2009-10:

1. Supplemental Education Services: Results and Accountability

Potential Scope: Evaluate the effectiveness and efficiency of supplemental education services. Assess opportunities to modify the program to improve outcomes at lower cost.

2. Multiple School Calendars and Schedules: Benefits and Costs

Identify opportunities to improve the development, use, and impact of school improvement plans and site councils.

<u>Adoption of 2009-10 Local Services Plan – Multnomah Education Service District</u>

RECITALS

- A. The 2009-10 Local Service Plan ("LSP") is essentially a menu of options offered by the Multnomah Education Service District ("MESD").
- B. Component districts of MESD are asked to approve the full complement of programs and services, which then constitutes the authorization for MESD to build capacity to make these programs and services available to component districts.
- C. The actual selection and use of resolution funds to pay for selected services remains at the discretion of each individual district.
- D. The MESD is expanding its role in providing data warehouse services to component districts in MESD and Clackamas ESD ("CESD") through a joint venture among MESD, CESD and School District No. 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon ("District"). The description of these services has been omitted from the LSP and should be included in the section entitled "Student System Applications."
- E. In response to 2008 regulatory changes, the LSP notes in the section entitled "Medicaid Billing Services School-Based Health Services" that MESD "serves component districts by utilizing resolution funds to make state match payments." Subsequently, the State of Oregon has determined that school districts must make their own match payments, so this service of the MESD is no longer available.
- F. The MESD is proposing significant changes to its costing methodology. MESD's proposed new costing methodology does not change the maximum transit authorization for any of the component districts, including the District.

RESOLUTION

- According to ORS 334.175, the District's Board of Education agrees to the conditions and provision of all programs and services, described in the <u>2009-10 Local Services Plan –</u> <u>Multnomah Education Service District</u>, EXCEPT as follows:
 - a. The description of data warehouse services outlined in Attachment A are to be included in the description of services in the section entitled "Student System Applications."

- b. The section entitled "Medicaid Billing Services School-Based Health Services" is clarified to note that MESD can no longer make the State match payments, but rather each school district is responsible for making their own match payments.
- c. The maximum transit authority for the District remains unchanged.
- 2. The Board acknowledges that in the event that the required resources are not available, each and every program and service is subject to reduction or elimination at the discretion of the MESD Board of Directors. If such reductions or eliminations are necessary, they will be made through contingency planning in cooperation with the superintendents of the local component districts.

Technology Services Student System Applications

Goal: Deliver administrative computer technology and support designed to increase the school districts' efficiency and improve internal and external communications.

Program Statement:

Technology Services supports the web-based VersiFit data warehouse application, designed to facilitate reporting and analysis of aggregate data or drill-down to student level data. All school districts in Multnomah County, and school districts using services from Clackamas ESD, share the same data warehouse instance, meeting ODE's requirement for a Regional Data Warehouse.

Proposed Modification(s) of Prior Year's Service: This is an expanded service for 2009-2010.*

Description of Services:

- Provide system and database administration including upgrade and patch installation, troubleshooting, operating system support, back-ups, and ETL (extract, transform, and load) routines
- Provide an administrator level dashboard for the purpose of viewing assessments, attendance, enrollments, incidents, marks, etc.
- Develop metrics and reports that are provided to districts based on their mutually chosen priorities
- Research and resolve data and metric discrepancies
- Keep combined data warehouse aligned with the ODE KIDS project

Statement of Positive Outcomes:

- Work with districts to prioritize enhancements to the data warehouse to support data-driven decision making.
- Coordinate data validation and reporting for ODE's KIDS project.
- Collaborate with other districts across the state to share resources and improve the data warehouse system.

^{*} Target is for transition by July 1 assuming the migration timelines are met and the knowledge transfer occurs between PPS and SISNet.

Approval of Application to Qualified Zone Academy Bonds

RECITALS

- A. School districts need assistance renovating schools, and the federal role in school construction was improved to help schools meet their needs through the establishment of Qualified Zone Academy Bonds ("QZABs"). QZABs allow school districts with low-income populations to save interest costs associated with financing school renovations and repairs. The Oregon Department of Education allows school districts to apply for QZABs of up to a specified cap or \$2 million, whichever is higher, where the school district satisfies certain criteria, as stated below:
 - School District 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon ("District") has reasonable expectations
 that as of the date of the issuance of the QZABs at least 35% of the students attending
 the schools or participating in the programs will be eligible for free or reduced-cost
 lunches established under the National School Lunch Act.
 - The District has received written commitments from private entity(ies) to make qualified contributions having a present value as of the date of issuance of not less than 10% of the proceeds of the bond issues.
 - 3. The public school or academic program within a public school is established by and operated under the supervision of an eligible local education agency (as defined in Section 14101 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965) to provide education below the post-secondary level;

Such school or program is designed in cooperation with business to enhance the academic curriculum, increase graduation and employment rates, and better prepare students for the rigors of college and the increasingly complex workforce;

Students in the academy are subject to the same academic standards and assessments as other students educated by the District; and

The comprehensive education plan of the school or program is approved by the District.

- B. The District plans to use the proceeds of the QZAB program for the rehabilitation or repair of the public school facilities in which the academy is established.
- C. The District will have a written spending plan on file with its Finance Department by the date of issuance of the QZABs.

Resolution Supporting an Ainsworth Elementary School
Field Improvement and Approving Field Naming

RECITALS

- A. The family of Julia Reimann, a 10-year-old student at Ainsworth Elementary School ("Ainsworth"), who was killed when an airplane crashed into a family vacation home in Gearhart, Oregon, in August 2008, along with family friends and the school community, approached Portland Public Schools ("District") to develop a memorial field at Ainsworth. Julia was an avid soccer player.
- B. The school children at Ainsworth currently do not have any soft, outdoor running/play surfaces. The entire outdoor play area is covered in asphalt. The proposed new field is designed to replace part of the existing playground, leaving a portion for hard surface play and retaining play equipment for younger children. The new field will have all-weather turf, allow play space for physical education and recreational play after school, and be available for the neighborhood's use, regardless of weather conditions.
- C. The memorial field organizers are supported by the Ainsworth PTA, which serves as the non-profit entity designated to hold donated funds on behalf of the field project. The District has also been supporting the project by providing project management and community outreach services. The Ainsworth PTA has agreed to serve as the permit holder granted by the District for constructing the improvements at Ainsworth under the direction of the District's project manager.
- D. The project was approved for project development under the standards and criteria used by the District's Facilities and Asset Management Department. Through Ainsworth PTA and neighborhood association fundraising, memorial gifts to the Reimann family, and individual donations, sufficient funds have been raised to complete the project as designed.
- D. The project organizers request that the new field be named for Julia Reimann. Board of Education ("Board") Policy 2.20.010-P and Administrative Directive 2.20.011-AD allow when consistent with all Board policies the special recognition of individuals when accompanied by monetary or in-kind donations. The process outlined in the Administrative Directive has been followed.
- F. To meet the deadlines for project completion before school begins in Fall 2009, the project organizers are requesting District project approval so that construction can be completed during the summer months. All design engineering services and materials are in place for construction to begin in early July.
- G. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee was given a written briefing on the project as it was being developed, has recently reviewed the project in greater detail, and unanimously recommends that the Board approve the project for construction.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board extends its sympathies to the family of Julia Reimann and acknowledges and greatly appreciates the efforts of Julia's family and friends to raise funds to create a new playing field at Ainsworth.
- 2. The Board authorizes the Superintendent to enter into a Permit for Donated Improvements with

the Ainsworth PTA to make the field improvements, as approved by District staff.

3. The Board authorizes the field be named "Julia Reimann Field" in memory of Julia Reimann, her love of outdoor play, and as her parents have said, as a means of "providing a place of renewal, with a new set of children playing on the field every year, and the potential that children will eventually give back to their community as a mother or a sister, a coach or a teacher, as Julia will through this field."

- D. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee reviewed this resolution on May 5, 2009, and recommends approval by the Board.

RESOLUTION

- 1. Due to the severe budget situation facing the District and the need to delay the staffing of schools, the Board recognizes that all open positions will not be able to be posted internally and externally by May 1, 2009. For this year, the Board directs the Superintendent to post open positions internally and externally as soon as possible under the circumstances.
- 2. This is a one-time exception that recognizes the current extraordinary budget situation. The annual posting deadline for all open positions to be posted internally and externally will revert back to no later than May 1, starting with the 2009-10 school year.

The entire policy remains under review, but it is currently necessary to move forward with this recommendation in order to clarify the graduation requirements for the Class of 2009.

RESOLUTION

The Board of Education accepts the Superintendent's recommendation and hereby waives the provision of Board Policy 4.20.042 requiring the graduating Class of 2009 to earn one proficiency-based credit for the development of a Senior Career Pathway Portfolio/Project.

Other Matters Requiring Board Action

The Superintendent **RECOMMENDED** adoption of the following items:

Numbers 4092 and 4093

During the Committee of the Whole, Director Regan moved adoption of Board Actions 4092. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed unanimously (vote: 7-yes, 0-no; Student Representative Stickler absent).

During the Committee of the Whole, Director Sargent moved adoption of Board Action 4093. The motion was put to a voice vote and passed unanimously (vote: 6-yes, 0-no; Director Gonzalez and Student Representative Stickler absent).

Resolution Approving Renewal of the Charter Agreement with Leadership and Entrepreneurship

Public Charter High School (Approving Appeal of Non-renewal)

RECITALS

- A. On August 1, 2006, School District No. 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon ("District"), entered into a contract with KOREducators for the operation of Leadership and Entrepreneurship Public Charter High School. The term of the contract is for three years, terminating on June 30, 2009.
- B. The process and criteria for considering the renewal of a charter are described in ORS 338.065. The criteria include a requirement that the first renewal of a charter must be for the same term as the initial charter.
- LEP delivered its request for renewal of its charter agreement consistent with ORS 338.065.
- D. The District Charter School Manager reviewed LEP's renewal request in good faith using criteria consistent with ORS 338.065(6), which require an evaluation of whether the public charter school
 - 1. Is in compliance with ORS Chapter 338 and all other applicable state and federal laws;
 - 2. Is in compliance with the charter of the public charter school;
 - 3. Is meeting or working toward meeting the student performance goals and agreements specified in the charter or in any other written agreements between the District and LEP:
 - 4. Is fiscally stable; and
 - 5. Is in compliance with any other renewal criteria specified in the charter.
- E. On February 9, 2009, the Board of Education's Subcommittee on Charters ("Subcommittee") met in work session prepare for the public hearing and to consider the Charter School Manager's report.
- F. On February 13, 2009, the Subcommittee held a public hearing to hear LEP's charter renewal request. A video recording and a copy of the hearing minutes and materials are on file at the District office.
- G. On March 12, 2009, after reviewing the information presented by LEP in support of its renewal request, including information from the public hearing, and the staff report, and based on information regarding LEP's fiscal stability, Superintendent Smith recommended that the District not renew the charter agreement with LEP after it expires. A copy of the Superintendent's recommendation is on file at the District office.
- H. On March 12, 2009, the Subcommittee met to deliberate and to craft its recommendation to the full Board of Education ("Board"). After careful consideration of the information presented at the public hearing and of the Superintendent's recommendation, the Subcommittee determined by a vote of 3-0 to recommend that the Board deny renewal of the District's charter agreement with LEP. The Subcommittee based its determination on its finding that LEP did not present evidence satisfactory to the District that the school is fiscally stable, including the following:
 - LEP had failed to report or pay into its employees' PERS accounts since July 2008, though it appears that LEP was withholding 6% employee PERS contributions from its employees' monthly paychecks.

- 2. LEP's expenses exceeded its revenue in 2007-08 and resulted in a deficit balance at June 30, 2008.
- 3. LEP had a long-term debt for tenant improvements.
- 4. LEP had a management fee due to its landlord in June 2009 and the lease payment was scheduled to increase next year unless otherwise negotiated.
- 5. LEP appeared to have outstanding, unpaid bills.
- 6. Despite the 10% reduction in salaries that LEP staff accepted in January 2009 and the fact that the District agreed to accelerate LEP's State School Fund ("SSF") payments for the remainder of the 2008-09 school year, this had not been enough to bring expenses into alignment with revenues.
- 7. The financial information provided to the District had been intermittent and at times unreliable and late.
- I. On March 18, 2009, the District's Performance Auditor released an audit report on the District's public charter schools. Recommendations from this audit included the following:
 - 1. Develop more specific and measurable goals for charter school performance
 - 2. Design and implement improved methods for monitoring charter school performance in achieving operational and academic goals.
 - 3. Develop and implement a more rigorous accountability system for monitoring and assessing charter school performance
 - 4. Encourage the State Department of Education to review elements of charter school legislation
- J On March 30, 2009, the Board determined by a vote of 6-1 (with Student Representative Stickler voting yes, unofficially) that the charter with LEP would not be renewed after its expiration on June 30, 2009.
- K. As required by OAR 581-020-0359(8), LEP resubmitted its request to renew its charter within 30 days after the date of the Board's vote to non-renew, and included new and significantly revised information about LEP's financial stability, sustainability, budget projections, fundraising, communication strategies, and understanding of its own financial situation. For instance, LEP has strengthened its internal controls, increased its Board's involvement in the financial operations of the school, raised over \$70,000 since February 2009, created a budget based on conservative and reasonable estimates, cleared its past debt to PERS, budgeted for a full-time business manager, and renegotiated its lease.
- L. The District Charter School Manager and financial staff reviewed LEP's revised renewal request in good faith using criteria consistent with ORS 338.065(6), as stated above.
- M. On May 13, 2009, the Subcommittee held a public hearing to hear LEP's revised charter renewal request. A video recording and a copy of the hearing minutes and materials are on file at the District office.
- N. On May 20, 2009, after reviewing the information presented by LEP in support of its renewal request, including information from the public hearing, and the staff report, and based on new and revised information regarding LEP's fiscal stability, Superintendent Smith recommended that the

district renew the charter agreement with LEP. A copy of the Superintendent's recommendation is on file at the District office.

O. On May 20, 2009, the Subcommittee met to deliberate and to craft its recommendation to the full Board. After careful consideration of the information presented at the public hearing and of the Superintendent's recommendation, the Subcommittee determined by a vote of 3-0 to recommend that the Board approve the appeal of the decision to non-renew by renewing the District's charter agreement with KOREducators, and direct district staff to negotiate a new charter agreement with LEP for a term of three years consistent with ORS Chapter 338 and with District policies.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board has determined that KOREducators' revised request to renew its charter meets the criteria of ORS Chapter 338.
- 2. The Board hereby directs District staff to negotiate, enter into, and execute a three-year charter agreement renewal between the District and KOREducators that is consistent with ORS Chapter 338 and with District policies, is in a form approved by the District's General Counsel, and includes the following conditions:
 - LEP will provide evidence satisfactory to the District of fiscal stability in the following ways that
 - i. Sources of donations and grants are reasonably assured, and that there is a plan in place for supplementing funds received from the SSF;
 - ii. LEP has a contingency plan in place, included in LEP's Board policy, if revenues are significantly less than or expenses are significantly more than projected, or if there is a significant cut in the SSF; and
 - iii. LEP will amend and resubmit each school year's budget to the District when there are any significant changes to the SSF charter school rates (prior to renewal contract execution).
 - b. LEP will provide a budget based on an estimate of \$25,000 in fundraising (prior to renewal contract execution).
 - c. LEP will, as budgeted, hire a full-time business manager to oversee its finances.
 - d. LEP staff and Board representatives will meet quarterly with District financial staff and the Charter School Manager to review finances.
 - e. As part of its quarterly reporting, LEP will submit proof that it is current with PERS payments.
 - f. As part of its quarterly reporting, LEP will submit a narrative with informal, brief comments on the following areas:
 - i. Operational
 - ii. Financial, including efforts to reduce its deficit
 - iii. Fundraising
 - iv. Any other issues affecting operational or financial components

- g. LEP will submit cohort studies and growth reports for fall-spring OAKS testing
- 3. Consistent with the conditions applied to other renewal contracts, LEP shall provide the following:
 - LEP will submit deliverables (including financial information, proof of insurance, etc.) on time, and consequences will be included in the contract if due dates for these items are not adhered to.
 - b. Evidence satisfactory to the District as to how LEP intends to meet specific legislative intents regarding the dissemination of different, innovative, and proven methods for instruction and assessment (as part of LEP's annual Accountability Plan).
 - c. Evidence that LEP's system of alternative assessments will be used to continuously measure student progress toward state, District, and school standards and to inform LEP's school improvement and accountability planning.
 - d. Evidence satisfactory to the District of LEP's detailed plan to improve writing and math scores (prior to renewal contract execution).
 - e. Evidence that LEP will rectify all instances where staff are not properly licensed or registered (prior to renewal contract execution).
 - f. Its cooperation in working with the District in developing performance measures and benchmarks for student achievement that assist in establishing student achievement measures and benchmarks for other District schools, and that will be used to continuously measure student progress toward state, district, and school standards and to inform LEP's school improvement and accountability planning.
 - g. ORS 338.065(4)(h) allows a public charter school and a sponsoring school district to negotiate a renewal process timeline that is different from the timeline required by ORS 338.065(4)(b-g). LEP and District will negotiate a renewal process timeline into any future contract with LEP that provides long-term planning and flexibility for the school and the District and that includes results of LEP's annual reports and of the District's annual site visits.
- 4. The Board hereby directs the Superintendent to report to the Board each year (via the appropriate committee) on LEP's compliance with the terms of the charter agreement. This report may be part of an overall report for all District-sponsored charter schools and should be submitted by May 1 of each year.

Budget Committee Approval of the FY 2009-10 Budget and Imposition of Property Taxes

RECITALS

- A. Oregon Local Budget Law (ORS 294.401) requires the Portland Public Schools ("District") Budget Committee to hold one or more meetings to receive the budget message and the budget document; and to provide members of the public with an opportunity to comment upon the budget document.
- B. Oregon Local Budget Law (ORS 294.406) requires each legal jurisdiction's Budget Committee approve a budget and specify *ad valorem* property tax rate for all funds.
- C. Oregon Local Budget Law (ORS 294.411) requires submission of the budget document to the Tax Supervising Conservation Commission ("TSCC") by May 15 of each year. The District requested an extension of this delivery date to June 9, 2009, which the TSCC granted on April 9, 2009.
- D. On March 16, 2009, the Budget Committee received the Superintendent's budget message and Proposed budget document.
- E. The Board of Education ("Board") appointed a Citizen Budget Review Committee ("CBRC") to review the Proposed Budget and expenditures of the Local Option Levy. The CBRC acts in an advisory capacity to the Board.
- F. On May 21, 2009 the Budget Committee received the Superintendent's revised Proposed Budget.
- G. On June 1, 2009, the Budget Committee held a public hearing to receive public comment on the proposed budget. The Budget Committee received testimony and a report on the Local Option Levy and testimony and budget recommendations from the CBRC.
- H. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee ("FAO") reviewed and discussed the Superintendent's revised Proposed Budget. FAO submitted a report and recommendations on the budget to the Budget Committee.
- I. The FAO voted unanimously to recommend the Budget Committee approve the budget as revised by the Superintendent.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Budget Committee approves the Superintendent's Proposed Budget as described in the Finance, Audit and Operations committee report.
- 2. The Budget Committee approves a fixed rate tax levy of \$4.7743 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for operations during tax year 2009-10.
- 3. The Budget Committee approves a permanent Gap Tax Levy rate of \$0.5038 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for operations during tax year 2009-10.

- 4. The Budget Committee approves local option property tax rate of \$1.2500 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for operations during tax year 2009-10.
- 5. The Budget Committee directs submittal of this approved budget to the TSCC by June 9, 2009, in accordance with ORS 294.411.

RESOLUTION No. 4097

Resolution Supporting Marysville School Park Improvements

RECITALS

- A. For more than two years, the Marysville School community, led by the school's former principal, has been developing a plan to improve the playground area behind Marysville School. A group of civic leaders formed the Marysville School Advisory Council ("Advisory Council") to provide fundraising support and design expertise in support of the plan.
- B. As described by the Advisory Council, "The area is designed to be focal point of the community and part of the school that combines the best educational practices with a wide range of enrichment activities of all ages. By enhancing the neighborhood, we heighten community spirit and create citizen involvement."
- C. The Advisory Council successfully raised \$600,000 from the Lents Urban Renewal District, \$365,000 from the City of Portland (a gift sponsored by Commissioner Randy Leonard), and smaller amounts from Spirit Mountain Community Fund, Portland Parks and Recreation, and Kaiser Permanente.
- D. Portland Public Schools ("District") staff has been working closely with the Advisory Council. Once the Portland Development Commission ("PDC") and the City of Portland made a major financial commitment, the District's Facilities Department approved the project for development, a necessary step in dedicating staff to assist with project coordination, community outreach, and governmental coordination.
- E. Fundraising has reached a level where the key elements of the planned design can be fully paid for, and construction can begin.
- F. Rose Community Development Corporation ("Rose CDC"), a non-profit corporation active in construction in Southeast Portland, has offered to take responsibility for managing the construction of the field improvements. Rose CDC has been under contract for other PDC-funded projects. By the terms of a Permit for Donated Improvements (as authorized by this Resolution), Rose CDC will be obligated, to complete the project according to District specifications.
- G. Rose CDC will be the grant recipient of PDC funding. The terms of the grant require that the District enter into an agreement with PDC and that the District be responsible for the ongoing operation and maintenance of the new school park once it is constructed.
- H. To meet the deadlines for project completion before school resumes in Fall 2009, the project organizers request District project approval, with construction to begin as early as mid-June.

I. The Finance, Audit and Operations Committee was briefed on the project and unanimously recommends that the Board of Education ("Board") approve the project for construction.

RESOLUTION

- The Board acknowledges and greatly appreciates the efforts of the Marysville School community, and specifically the Advisory Council members who have spent significant time and resources to develop the concept of a new school park at Marysville School and to find the financial resources to bring the project to reality.
- 2. The Board authorizes the Deputy Clerk to enter into and execute a Permit for Donated Improvements with the Rose CDC to manage the construction of the school park improvement; and to enter into and execute an agreement with PDC and Rose CDC for construction, operation and maintenance of the school park in a form approved by the District's General Counsel.

Establishing Two New Funds: Fund 407, IT System Project Fund and Fund 307, IT Projects Debt Service

RECITALS

- A. On December 10, 2007, by way of Resolution No. 3821, the Board of Education ("Board") for Portland Public Schools ("District") adopted an Interim Long-Range Facilities Plan ("Plan") that will entail issuance of debt instruments.
- B. The Plan includes forecasted expenditures for capital construction, major (capital) renovation, and information technology ("IT") projects.
- C. School districts should maintain only those funds that are required to meet legal and operating requirements.
- D. Fund 407, the "IT System Project Fund," will be used to manage capital and operating expenditures for specifically authorized IT projects.
- E. Oregon Local Budget Law (ORS 294.326) requires a debt service fund to manage the repayment of principal and interest on long-term debt issues.
- F. Fund 307, the "IT Projects Debt Service Fund," will be used to manage the repayment of principal and interest for funds borrowed to support specifically authorized IT projects.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board hereby establishes Fund 407, the "IT System Project Fund," to manage information technology project expenditures for projects recommended by the Information Technology Executive Committee and as authorized by the Board.
- 2. The Board hereby establishes Fund 307, the "IT Projects Debt Service Fund," to manage the repayment of principal and interest resulting from the issuance of debt instruments.
- 3. The Board budgets revenues and appropriates expenditures as summarized by program in the FY 2009-10 Adopted Budget.

RESOLUTION No. 4107

Imposing and Categorizing Taxes – School District No. 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon

RECITALS

- A. ORS 310.060 requires a school district (or other entity "authorized to levy or impose a tax on property") to provide written notice to its county assessor of the district's intent to impose property taxes. This notification must include two copies of a lawfully adopted resolution categorizing the taxes.
- B. Oregon Local Budget Law (ORS 294.435) requires that before the Measure 5 constitutional limits can be tested, taxes on property must be categorized in one of three classes: General Government, Education, or Excluded from Limitation.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The Board imposes the taxes provided for in the Adopted Budget at the permanent rate of \$4.7743 per \$1,000 of assessed value for operations during the tax year 2009-10.
- 2. The Board imposes the taxes provided for in the Adopted Budget at the permanent gap levy rate of \$0.5038 per \$1,000 of assessed value for operations during the tax year 2009-10.
- 3. The Board imposes local option property taxes provided for in the Adopted Budget at the rate of \$1.2500 per \$1,000 of assessed value for operations during the tax year 2009-10.
- 4. These taxes are hereby imposed and categorized as Education for tax year 2009-10 upon the assessed value of all taxable property in the District, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 4108

Adoption of the 2009-10 Budget for School District No. 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon

RECITALS

- A. On June 8, 2009, by way of Resolution No. 4096, and under the provisions of Oregon Local Budget Law (ORS Ch. 294), the Budget Committee for School District No. 1J, Multnomah County, Oregon ("District"), approved the FY 2009-10 budget.
- B. As directed by ORS 294.411, the District submitted the Approved Budget to the Tax Supervising Conservation Commission ("TSCC") of Multnomah County, Oregon, by June 9, 2009.
- C. The TSCC held a public hearing on the Approved Budget on June 29, 2009.
- A. The TSCC certified the approved budget with no objections.

RESOLUTION

- 1. The District's Board of Education ("Board") hereby adopts the budget for the fiscal year 2009-10 in a total sum of \$631,680,226.
- 2. The budget document shall be available in the District administrative office and available on-line at the District's website no later than July 15, 2009.
- 3. The Board appropriates for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, the expenditure amounts summarized by program in Attachment A to this resolution.

RESOLUTION No. 4109

Naming Resolution for Harrison Park School (Formerly Clark K-8@Binnsmead School)

RECITALS

- A. In 2008, Binnsmead Middle School was closed, and Clark Elementary School moved from its location into the Binnsmead Middle School site. Board Policy 2.20.011-AD, "Procedures for Naming School District Property and Focus Options" ("Naming Policy"), directs the Board of Education ("Board") on selecting a new school name. This new site was given the temporary name of Clark K-8@Binnsmead until a suitable name could be decided.
- B. In late 2008, District staff assisted in convening an advisory committee made up of the Clark K-8@ Binnsmead School principal, teaching staff, and community members from the PTA and Site Council. The committee's charge was to set up a fair and inclusive process for selecting a new name for Clark K-8@Binnsmead School and to provide a final list of names for consideration to the Superintendent.
- C. Flyers (in five languages) outlining the process for submitting name choices to the committee were distributed to teachers, staff, and students at Clark K-8@Binnsmead School; and to community organizations. An email account was set up where community members could make suggestions and submit them directly to the committee.
- D. In March 2009, the committee reviewed the recommendations from the aforementioned community processes and, finding that none of the names submitted stood out as a clear favorite during the process, proceeded with an additional round of suggestions from the committee, deciding upon the name Harrison Park School.
- E. Harrison Park School identifies with the highly used park adjacent to the school, offers the geographic location to the school in which the neighborhood is also named, anchors the school in

the community, and comports with the District's Naming Policy, which states that recommended names may:

- 1. Be known and significant to the community, students and staff;
- 2. Relate to local neighborhoods;
- Relate to relevant geographic areas;
- 4. Relate to places of historical, geographical, geologic or cultural significance;
- 5. Relate to indigenous and characteristic flora or fauna; and
- 6. Be thematic to reflect the character of the community culture and history of the area
- F. The Superintendent reviewed the recommendations presented by the committee and proposed Harrison Park School as the best choice.
- G. On May 13, 2009, the Student Support and Community Relations Committee ("SSCR") reviewed the Superintendent's recommendation. Since the Harrison Park name was not on the community survey, SSCR asked the advisory committee to conduct additional outreach.
- H. On June 18, 2009, SSCR received information that additional outreach to the community garnered positive feedback. SSCR unanimously supported Harrison Park School as the new name.

RESOLUTION

The Board hereby resolves that Harrison Park School be the new name for the current Clark K-8@ Binnsmead School.

RESOLUTION No. 4110

Amendment to Student Conduct and Discipline Policy 4.30.010-P

RESOLUTION

The Board of Education ("Board") for Portland Public Schools ("District") reviewed recommendations by the Student Support and Community Relations Committee to amend the Student Conduct and Discipline Policy 4.30.010-P. As directed by Board Policy 1.70.020-P, "Policies and Administrative Directives," the Board is required to place any new policy or updates to previous District policies on the District website for a 21-day public review. Having fulfilled this obligation and having received public input on the proposed policy amendment, the Board supports the proposed policy language for adoption.

PROPOSED POLICY:

Student Conduct and Discipline 4.30.010-P

I. Introduction

A. The Board is committed to a positive, respectful, inclusive climate in every school that promotes academic achievement, ensures safe and drug-free learning communities, provides positive behavior supports, ensures equitable outcomes in discipline, and maximizes the time students spend in school.

- B. Recognizing that student discipline practices are closely related to student achievement, the Board supports school practices that:
 - Are well researched and result in safer schools grounded in equity, improved student achievement, improved student attendance, and increased student accountability;
 - 2. Provide consistency, fairness, and equitable interventions and consequences across all schools in the district:
 - 3. Eliminate disparities in applying discipline by assuring equitable interventions and consequences across all racial and ethnic groups, by gender, among those with disabilities and other protected classes (see 1.80.020-P Non-Discrimination);
 - 4. Define and communicate expectations for student behavior;
 - 5. Define and communicate expectations for staff responsibilities related to student conduct and discipline;
 - 6. Balance the needs of the student, the needs of those directly affected by a student's behavior, and the needs of the overall school community;
 - 7. Engage parents/guardians early in the disciplinary process;
 - 8. Facilitate students, staff, parents/guardians and the community working together to provide both academic and non-academic support to students.

II. Student Conduct Principles

- A. Proper student conduct, reinforced by an effective discipline program based on best practices and cultural responsiveness, is essential to creating and maintaining a positive, respectful, and inclusive school climate.
- B. A positive, respectful, and inclusive school climate is the mutual responsibility of:
 - District staff, who are expected to create an environment for student success using principles of positive behavior support/effective discipline practices and cultural competency in managing student conduct;
 - 2. Students, who are expected to learn to function effectively in a school environment, learn the consequences of their behavior, develop self-discipline and take responsibility for their actions;
 - Parents/guardians, who are expected to take an active role in school efforts to implement positive behavior supports and to work with schools to address their students' needs; and
 - 4. The community, whose partnerships are encouraged and welcomed in supporting appropriate student behavior.
- C. Students shall comply with the authority of district staff as granted by law and with District standards of conduct including the school-based Student Conduct and Discipline Plan. They shall conduct themselves in an orderly manner at school during the school day and during school-sponsored activities.

III. Discipline Principles

- A. Discipline should be equitable, timely, fair, developmentally appropriate, and match the severity of the student's misbehavior.
- B. Discipline should teach students to behave in ways that contribute to academic and behavioral success, and to support a school environment where students and staff are positive, respectful and inclusive.

- C. Discipline should prevent misbehavior before it occurs, and use effective interventions after it occurs.
- D. Discipline should be used to support students in learning the skills necessary to enhance a positive school climate and avoid negative behavior. School discipline that is paired with meaningful instruction and guidance offers students an opportunity to learn from their mistakes and contribute to the school community, and is more likely to result in getting the student re-engaged in learning.
- E. The District and schools shall make every reasonable effort to first correct student misbehavior through family and school-based resources. These efforts involve analyzing individual student needs and adult responses, developing preventive and responsive interventions and providing disciplinary and educational alternatives.
- F. Discipline should start at the lowest possible level reasonably calculated to change the student's behavior and to minimize the loss of instructional time. District administrators are authorized to expel students from schools pursuant to District policies and administrative directives. However, unless there is extreme disruption of the educational process or behavior that poses a danger to persons or property, exclusionary discipline practices should be the action of last resort.

IV. Monitoring and Accountability

- A. Ongoing monitoring shall be used to ensure that equitable school-based practices are implemented in a fair, non-discriminatory, and culturally responsive manner.
- B. The Superintendent shall establish a structure at the District and school level to monitor progress on student conduct, including annual reporting to the Board.
- C. The monitoring structure shall be connected to School and District Improvement Plans and designed to identify areas of need, target areas of concern, thus enabling schools and the District to craft solutions.
- D. Monitoring information shall be presented in a manner that is transparent and accessible to administrators, teachers, and the general public.

V. Implementation

- A. The District shall publish and distribute to staff, students and parents rules outlining student rights and responsibilities, conduct expectations, and possible disciplinary actions.
- B. The Superintendent shall develop administrative directives, procedures and standards to implement this policy.
- C. The implementation of this policy and corresponding directives will be consistent with related Federal and State law, District policies, and collective bargaining agreements.
- D. Resource allocation decisions to implement this policy will consider the strong link between discipline and academic achievement.

<u>Insurance Coverage Renewal and Payment of</u> 2009-10 Fiscal Year Premiums Self-Insurance Funds

RECITALS

- A. The District's Risk Management Department and the Chief Financial Officer, along with Beecher Carlson, the District's insurance broker, embarked on a comprehensive team investigative effort to find the best value for District excess property, crime, casualty, liability, and workers' compensation insurance.
- B. This marketing effort resulted in a 4.4% increase for our overall excess insurance premium cost. Coverage in the District's crime policy, however, was improved.
- C. Beecher Carlson decreased by 15% their annual charge for these services.

RESOLUTION

- The Board of Education directs the Deputy Clerk to enter into and execute contracts for excess property, crime, casualty, liability, workers' compensation, and other insurance for the 2009-10 fiscal year in a form approved by the District's General Counsel and the Risk Management Department.
- 2. The premiums for coverage and broker fees total \$1,025,243 and will be charged to the Self-Insurance Fund 601.
