

Letter From Our Principal

Dear Glencoe Families,

Last Thursday was Principal for a Day and I was able to spend the morning with Alissa Keny-Guyer, the State Representative for our SE area. This is an opportunity sponsored by All Hands Raised to bring individuals into the schools to understand each schools' successes and challenges. We visited classrooms, talked to students and teachers and spent some time talking about Measure 97 and the positive impact it could have on education. If you have not yet researched this Measure I encourage you to do so before you turn in your ballot.

Friday night was the annual Harvest Festival. I heard from many families that it was one of the best ones to date. Not holding much history here all I can say is that it was very well done. There were so many new games, circus activities, Food Carts to order dinner and of course some repeat favorites such as Fortune Telling and Book Giveaways. I want to thank all the families who helped plan, set-up, execute and clean up. It was quite the production!

We are heading into an inconsistent school calendar this month with a variety of interruptions to the school week. Please make sure you are checking the calendar of events on our website.

Conferences are the week of Wednesday and Thursday, November 9th and 10th. Teachers will review a progress report, not report card, to give parents a solid understanding of their child's academic and social/emotional skills. If you have not yet signed up for a Parent/Teacher conference, please contact the main office for your appointment. If you are a parent of a current 4th or 5th grader you should have received your child's state Smarter Balanced test results from Spring 2016 in the mail. If you have questions

about this information, feel free to bring the letter with you so teachers can explain the results.

Each school received a State Report Card in October. I reviewed the test results at Site Council and the October PTA meeting. Although schools did not receive an overall rating the report card shared each school's participation rate on the state test and students' performance in both math and reading. Out of the 220 students who took the state test 154/220 in math and 165/220 in reading performed at or above the performance expectation for their grade level. This is an increase in performance levels from Spring 2015. We had approximately 40 students who did not participate in the testing process so our participation rate fell under the 95% expectations set by the state. According to these results there is a gap in achievement between our white students, our students of color and our economically disadvantaged students. This is something that we are aware of and are attempting to address through our Equity and CARE work as a staff.

We are finally reaching Daylight Savings and turning our clocks back. So, don't forget to turn your clocks back one hour this coming Saturday night, November 5th.

Hope to see you at this month's PTA meeting, Parent/Teacher Conferences or Family Art night on November 17th at 6:00 pm.

Dear Glencoe Parents,

As we are moving into cold and flu season I just want to remind everyone about keeping your sick kiddos home from school. - Fever of 100.5 degrees or higher (orally)
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Cough: deep, barking, congested or productive

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Help Your Child Succeed in School: **Build the Habit of Good Attendance Early**

School success goes hand in hand with good attendance!

DID YOU KNOW?


- · Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks.
- · Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Good attendance will help children do well in high school, college, and at work.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- · Set a regular bed time and morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Find out what day school starts and make sure your child has the required shots.
- Introduce your child to her teachers and classmates before school starts to help her transition.
- Don't let your child stay home unless she is truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and not a reason to stay home.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors, or other parents for advice on how to make her feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- Develop back-up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor, or another parent.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session.
